

Cure Violence: Treating Violence Like a Disease

At what point does violent crime reach a tipping point? The first four months of 2019 have been the deadliest since 2006. 59 victims—men,


women, and children of all ages killed bethis fore article went into print. Jacksonville leaders h a v e searched



for answers to our violent crime problem, but the homicide rate has remained relatively flat in recent years. How many more innocent victims are killed before this problem is approached from a different angle?

Last month was especially violent. Shots rang out on Mother's Day when a man took the life of his wife and 18-year-old niece before turning the gun on himself. On May 17, a 16year-old Raines High School student was shot while attending a spring football game at Terry Parker High School.

Coinciding with this outburst of violence was the announcement of a



new, alternative strategy that Jacksonville leaders have been preparing to roll out for several months. The new program is called Cure Violence and it's rooted in epidemiology of all things.

The program's founder, Gary Slutkin, is an epidemiologist that studied infectious diseases in Africa for ten years. He noticed through charts and maps documenting violent crime, that violence directly mimics infections like tuberculosis and AIDS. Treatment therefore, should follow the regimen applied to these diseases: go after the most infected and stop the infection at its source.

"It's guided by the understanding that violence is a health issue, that the epidemic of violence is preventable," said Mayor Lenny Curry in video posted on May 26. "Right now we are currently hiring and training very carefully selected members of the community—trusted insiders who will be able to anticipate where violence may occur so they can intervene before it happens."

Remorse

A jury convicted the defendant of possessing a firearm as a convicted felon. According to the trial testimony, a teenager was driving a car with the defendant as a passenger. An officer stopped the car and found drugs, drug paraphernalia,

and a gun. The teenage driver testified that he did not know a gun was in the car until right before the traffic stop, when the defendant pulled out the gun, wrapped in an orange shirt, and stuffed it under the

The jury convicted the defendant and the case proceeded to the sentencing phase. The presentence investigation report noted the defendant's "extensive criminal history," which included "numerous violent offenses." It also concluded that the defendant appeared to have a history of gang related activity, and 'apparently continues to be a threat to the safety of the community." The PSI report recommended the max-

At the sentencing hearing, the defendant declared he was innocent, insisted that the gun was not his, and that the jury convicted him without sufficient evidence. After the defendant spoke, the trial judge pronounced sentence. In doing so, the judge recounted the defendant's significant criminal history and told him, "You still fail to take any responsibility for your actions." The court concluded that, "Considering your history here, your failure to take any responsibility, the nature of the crime, the fact that it involves a firearm, the court will sentence you to 15 years, which is the statutory maximum."

The defendant challenged, on appeal, the trial judge's consideration of his lack of remorse in sentencing the defendant.

The appellate court provided an extensive analysis of the role of remorse in sentencing a criminal defendant. The court offered its opinion that our federal and state courts have frequently said that it is well established that the judge may consider a lack of remorse when imposing a sentence. In Florida, sentencing statutes explicitly authorize a consideration of remorse and responsibility. The federal sentencing guidelines similarly consider an acceptance of responsibility as a legitimate and appropriate factor. The court reiterated that a defendant's remorse or willingness to accept responsibility comprises part of the whole picture. These factors speak to a defendant's character and to the defendant's potential for rehabilitation. If a defendant is remorseful, the court said, it

What makes Cure Violence such an interesting alternative to reducing violent crime is its approach. By fighting violent crime like a contagious virus, the program shifts focus from policing to prevention, a way to intercept violence before it occurs. This model "uses the same three components that are used to reverse epidemic disease outbreaks: 1) Interrupting transmission of the disease. 2) Reducing the risk of the highest risk. 3) Changing community

For example, workers in the program will enter into affected communities and work towards stopping violence due to lack of communication or a tense situation. One such worker in an interview with BBC said that she was able to defuse violence by arranging funerals, talking to and distracting violent leaders, and visiting hospitals and apartment complexes. With this approach, victims are given the support and attention they need, which in turn leads to fewer retaliations.

Leaders for the program maintain that even though Cure Violence is a non-policing approach, it is designed to work alongside the city's existing policing efforts, possibly even reducing the pressure on law enforcement as a whole. At a meeting with Jacksonville leaders, Brent Decker, chief program officer at Cure Violence, said, "confidence in the police was found to improve at a higher rate in Cure Vio-

The Chicago-based organization has had statistically-proven success in reducing violent crime for 15 years and in multiple cities. Even though Jacksonville is late to the strategy, it is unique. Jacksonville is the first "Cure Violence" city where the mayor, sheriff, and state attorney all strongly support the program. With collaboration between all three, many leaders expect a higher chance of suc-

"This is really a boots on the ground, innovative approach to interrupting some of these repeated acts of violence that occur," said Sheriff Mike Williams after meeting with Cure Violence in February. This strategy is directed really at that, so we're looking forward to getting this off the ground." Melissa Nelson echoed Mike Williams with her support for the strategy in an interview. "The pride they have in the work they're doing and difference they're making is very encouraging to me," she said.

The most important question, however, is how will victims react to these new initiatives? Some are worried that the state's passing of Marsy's Law will present challenges to Cure Violence. Under Marsy's Law information about victims is kept confidential. Victims can choose to release information, but without total cooperation between victims and workers, Cure Violence could run into some problems in preventing future violent crimes.

Perhaps Jacksonville's main objective should be to strike the perfect balance between respecting victims' rights in Marsy's Law and giving Cure Violence the best opportunity to succeed in preventing violent crimes. After all, less violence equals less vic-

The secret word is father. With the uptick in violent crime this year, maybe this new program is a blessing for our city. Can an organization from Chicago solve a violence problem in Jacksonville? Maybe not entirely, but sometimes problems are solved with a fresh perspective and a different set of eyes. When violent crime continues to plague a city something needs to change.

At the Justice Coalition office our hallway is covered from end to end with the pictures of innocent victims lost to violent crime. If Cure Violence can prevent us from putting even one more picture up, then that's a step in the right direction.



means that he is sorry he committed the crime for which he is to be sentenced. One who so regrets his acts may not commit such acts in the fu-

A previous Florida appellate case had held that the fact that a defendant has pleaded not guilty could not be used against him or her during any stage of the proceedings. That situation was different, the court said.

The court concluded its analysis by stating that in some other case it might appear that a judge's refusal to grant leniency is tantamount to punishing the defendant for going to trial. But this is not that case. Here the judge simply observed that, after a long criminal history, the defendant continued to commit crimes - that even after multiple convictions and multiple punishments, the defendant 'still fails to take any responsibility for his actions." The judgment and sentence were affirmed by the appellate

The case is Davis vs State of Florida, and was decided by the First District Court of Appeal on April 25, 2019.




