

JSO, COJ, and SAO Collaborate to Reduce Jacksonville's "Persistent Problem with Violent Crime"

Earlier this year, the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, the State Attorney's Office, and the City of Jacksonville released a 32-page Gang Reduction Strategy. The comprehensive strategy, which went into effect in September 2018, outlines initiatives and technology strategies from each office that aim to reduce violent crime in Jacksonville.

In the document, while all three offices do acknowledge that there is a steady problem of violent crime in Jacksonville, they also conclude that this crime comes mostly from a small number of people involved in gang and drug activity.

The report states that "violent crime is an indicator of the overall health and safety of any community. Although the overall crime rate in Jacksonville is down, homicides, aggravated assaults, and other instances of violence increased in 2017. This increase is believed to have been caused, in part, by a small group of offenders made up of young adults and gang affiliates."

Sheriff Mike Williams added in the report that a collaborative strategy is needed because of the complexity of the issue. "You have a small number of people—people whose names we know, by the way—who are involved in this kind of activity," Sheriff Williams says. "While it seems like a huge issue, and it is, it is very complex, it is not something that you can't work on and get your hands around."

The strategy requires the collaboration of all three offices and in the report each offers its own initiatives--some that have already been implemented and some new.

The Jacksonville Sheriff's Office has begun conducting gang "call-ins" where known violent individuals are called in to "receive a dual message of warning and encouragement." JSO calls this a "Hope and Hammer" approach where individuals are warned about the direction they're moving in and encouraged to make more positive choices.

Other JSO initiatives include custom intervention notices where the most violent repeat offenders are given a personal visit and offered an opportunity to make positive changes and the Gun Bounty program which offers award money to tips leading to illegally registered firearms. JSO has also cleverly begun using social media campaigns like the "9 P.M. Routine" to reach more people. Daily social media posts are made to encourage people to lock their cars at night in an effort to reduce firearms from being stolen.

The City of Jacksonville is doing its part by investing in crime fighting technologies. COJ and JSO have invested in law enforcement's access to the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN). NIBIN is a national database that allows ballistic evidence to be captured and compared.

Other City-led investment technologies include a new ballistic water tank and ShotSpotter—a new gunshot detector.

Encounter with a Home Intruder

A Scary Experience Opens Eyes to World of Violent Crime

James Axton first encountered Donaven Brown the week before one of the worst days of his life. Five years earlier, Mr. Axton moved back into his 85-year-old mother's house after a career opening restaurants across the country. It's the same house he grew up in. His grandfather purchased the home 70-something years ago and at 66 years old, Axton still remembers vividly how safe he felt growing up in that house. Back then, the door was always left unlocked. "This is not a bad neighborhood," he says. Even now, he still feels that the San Jose home that he grew up in is a good place to live, but his experience with an intruder in 2018 has made him sharply aware that times have changed.

In the days leading up to that night, Axton remembers a man walking up and down his street asking neighbors if there was any yard work that needed to be done. When Brown knocked on his door and asked him if he needed his grass cut, it seemed like a strange question considering he didn't have a lawn mower. Axton was on his way out to have lab work done; he had recently been diagnosed with cancer and agreeing to yard work from a stranger was the last thing on his mind. He told him he didn't need his grass cut as he walked out the door.

When he returned home around noon, Brown was at his house again, this time talking to his mother about pulling weeds. Axton was beginning to feel uneasy now. He remembers talking to his mother and telling her that they didn't need him around the house.

Axton asked him to leave, but around three in the afternoon, Brown came yet again. He felt like this man wouldn't take no for answer. "What kind of person goes from house to house for hours asking to do yard work with no tools," Axton asked himself. His gut was telling him that something wasn't quite right with this guy. When Brown rang the bell for the third time, Axton prudently snapped a picture of him when he opened the door. He wanted to make sure that if anything did happen, at least he had a photo to show police.

The Defense Theory

Florida appellate courts often allow the accused in a criminal case wide latitude in proving their theory of the case. In a recent case the State charged the defendant with one count of sexual battery and one count of lewd or lascivious molestation of a child under the age of 12. The child victim was the natural daughter of the accused. The charge stemmed from a single incident of alleged inappropriate touching that occurred two years before it was reported. Initially, the child did not say anything to the defendant or to her mother about the incident. The child indicated that she did not want her father to go to jail.

Two years later, however, the mother reported the incident to authorities. A week later, the mother and child went to the police station where the child gave a detailed statement. She was not examined by the sexual assault treatment center. The testimony at the trial revealed that the defendant and the mother had been married for nearly 10 years prior to the report of the incident. Shortly after the defendant's arrest, the mother opened a dating website account and began dating. Within



months of the defendant's arrest, the mother filed for divorce, and remarried not long after the divorce was finalized.


At the trial the defendant decided to call his first wife (his previous wife, not the mother of the victim) and son to testify. As defense counsel explained, the testimony would show the mother had motive and bias to have the defendant arrested. The defendant believed she "brainwashed" the child to make up the charges. The trial judge did not permit the testimony. The defense attorney proffered their testimony into the record. The sons had been living with the defendant prior to his arrest. His first wife moved in with the mother, the child, and her sons after the arrest. Both testified to the mother's dating behavior after the defendant's arrest and how the mother spent money taken from the defendant's retirement account for plastic surgery. They both observed the mother began dating immediately upon the defendant's arrest.

The defendant's son witnessed a difference in how the mother acted after the defendant went to jail. She began dating and acting single.

The jury did not hear any of this testimony. The defendant testified and denied ever touching the child in

tion system that alerts law enforcement to gunfire in certain areas. The COJ has also helped to invest in the creation of a Crime Gun Intelligence Center (CGIC). “CGICs are interagency collaborations focused on real-time collection and analysis of intelligence related to firearm-related crimes.”

The State Attorney’s Office details four initiatives in the report: a targeted prosecution unit, an arrest alert system, community prosecution, and the Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee.

State Attorney Melissa Nelson echoed Mike Williams on the importance of collaboration between the offices and underscored the need for a comprehensive strategy for such a complex problem. “There is not a single solution that is going to fix this problem,” Nelson says in the report. “It has to be multifaceted, it has to be comprehensive, and it has to be expansive. Law enforcement cannot do it alone. To be successful and enduring, the community must be engaged from our schools to our religious and business communities.”

In addition to putting into writing current and pending initiatives, the document outlines proposed solutions to put these initiatives into action. The initiatives outlined show that our city is dedicated to solving the violent crime problem, but strategy concedes that “they are not enough to effectively combat and prevent violence within Jacksonville.” After reviewing out how other successful programs around the country put into effect these initiatives, it is concluded that the two most important things are “(A) the value of a collaborative, comprehensive strategy and (B) the need for focused administrative oversight.”

Perhaps the most important takeaway is that strategy puts specific plans to reduce violent crime into writing. The transparency sends a strong message to victims and all residents of Jacksonville that the city is making a big step forward in reducing violence crime.

appropriately. The jury acquitted the defendant of the sexual battery count, but convicted him of lewd or lascivious molestation of a child under the age of 12. The court sentenced him to 25 years of incarceration.

The defendant argued on appeal that the judge made a mistake in prohibiting his first wife and son from testifying. He argued the testimony was relevant and admissible to show the mother’s bias and prejudice.

The appellate court ruled that if the evidence tends in any way, even directly, to establish a reasonable doubt of the defendant’s guilt, it is error to deny its admission. Here the defendant’s theory was that the mother coaxed the child to make up the molestation charges so that the mother could be free to date other men. The testimony would’ve been used to prove that upon the defendant’s arrest, the mother immediately began dating, used some of the defendant’s money for plastic surgery, and married as soon as her divorce was final, within months of the defendant’s arrest. Thus there was a possibility that the evidence tended to create a reasonable doubt.

Accordingly, the appellate court reversed the defendant’s conviction and remanded the case for a new trial. The case was decided by the Fourth District Court of Appeal on May 20, 2015.

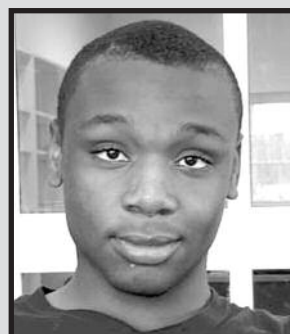

Four days later, on a Monday night around 9 P.M., Axton woke up when he heard his dog Jackie barking. "One of the real heroes in the story is my dog. She was barking, going crazy in the hall way by my Mom's room," Axton says. "I looked up from my bed and saw that her door was half-way shut." Sometimes Jackie would get out through the back door and leave it open. What happened next was shocking. "When I heard her say that there's a man in here, I wasn't thinking at that point. I just flew out of my bed and behind the door was the same guy that came by to cut the grass. But he was in his underwear."

Axton instinctively slammed the door in his face. The two struggled for a moment before he noticed that on the dresser was a can of bug spray that he was close enough to reach. He remembers slamming it into Brown's face defensively as they both cut across the hall way into his room. The secret word is luck. When the two were separated for a split second, Brown went for his wallet that was sitting on his end table. It was his opportunity. "I finally started to get a little sense to me," he says. "With him holding my wallet with one hand, I was able to hit him with both hands."

Axton fought him all the way out the front door and finally wrestled him out of the house. "He got out the door in his underwear with only a bus pass and six dollars in my wallet," he says.

At that point, Axton's Mom was able to call 9-1-1. Axton will never forget the whirlwind of police activity that ensued over the next couple hours. There were at least 10 police cars at his house, a helicopter flying over the neighborhood, and most importantly he says, a K-9 Unit. He has tremendous gratitude for the police dog Uno, who picked up Brown's scent and took him down only a couple hours after he fled the house.

Axton's experience changed his outlook on crime. He says he's become more empathetic. When talking about his own experience he's quick to point out that it could have been much worse. "It took me a week to shake real bad you know. You

realize what could have happened. Not just to me, but especially to my mother."

After talking with his JC victim advocates Aida Quinones and Jo-Lee Manning, he was moved by the stories of other victims. At Justice Coalition events he hears their experiences and listens to what they've gone through and feels lucky in comparison. He likes to say that there are three heroes to his story, the two dogs, Jackie and Uno, and the Justice Coalition. "My Mom is still going to counseling and therapy—professional therapy and counseling, but the Justice Coalition is my therapy," he says.

His advice to other victims is to go to every court date and face them. "Let them know that you're not afraid," he says. "Go to court and let them know that you're not going to let this stuff go. And take a victim's advocate with you."

copies. The Justice Coalition people are always there with the paperwork and anything I need. They know how to talk with my Mom about counselors if she needs them. When he (Donaven Brown) stepped on a pair of my prescription glasses they let me know how I could get reimbursed for new ones. Now, when anybody from the Justice Coalition needs me to do anything, I'll be there because they were there for me. They've all been wonderful—Aida, Jo-Lee, and of course Mike Liles. They've really been my therapy."

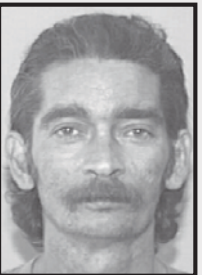

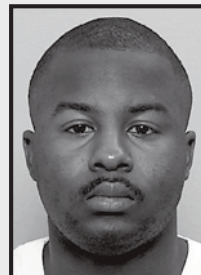

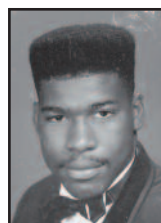
