Race will be held downtown March 2, 2019 in remembrance of Michael Liles to benefit the Justice Coalition

The Cowford Chophouse is proud to announce its third annual MOO-VE IT 5K will be held downtown on March 2, 2019 in remembrance of the late Michael Liles, former executive director of the Justice Coalition. The race will benefit the Justice Coalition, a non-profit organization that advocates on behalf of innocent victims of violent crime in the five-county area of Northeast Florida.

Proceeds from the MOO-VE IT 5K will be donated in Michael Liles's name to the Justice Coalition to support the organization's mission to advocate for victims, educate victims about their rights, and work with law enforcement to make our communities safer. This year's race will help fund the Justice Coalition's newspaper, the Victims' Advocate, which shares victims' stories and is just one way the organization provides victims with a welcoming and safe community for healing.

"The Justice Coalition provides remarkable support for victims and their families," said Cowford Chophouse owner Jacques Klempf. "We are proud to bring the community together through the MOO-VE IT 5K to raise awareness and funds that provide a voice for victims of crime in honor of Michael, whose incredible work has helped so many."

Michael began his work with the Justice Coalition in 2017 after the passing of his wife due to a violent crime. His dedication led the organization to offer Michael the executive director position, in which he fought tirelessly to protect victims and their families. Michael Liles passed away on October 16, 2018 at the age of 62. Michael and his wife are survived by their five children and eight grandchildren.

"Michael's passion for victims was unparalleled, and his work to help them during the most difficult times of their lives will always be remembered," said Robert Bracewell, chair of the Justice Coalition. "While Michael's loss continues to be felt throughout the community, we will carry on our mission to stand up for those affected by crime and hope the Jacksonville community will stand with us by participating in the MOO-VE IT 5K in remembrance of Michael."

A New Year's Murder: Sahara Barkley Remembered

For many of us, New Year's is a time to look back and reflect, while also looking forward to what lies ahead. It's a day that we celebrate and enjoy with people that we love. For Rosie Brooks-White, New Year's is different. Instead of a fresh start, Brooks is left wondering what could have been. 2018 began with the loss of her daughter and 2019 will be the first full year without her.

Brooks-White's daughter, Sahara Barkley, left her house in Riverside on New Year's Day 2018 to pick up cigarettes at a BP gas station on Stockton Street. Sahara left her car running as she walked up to the front door of the convenience store. At the same time, a black sedan with two people inside approached the gas station. 22-year-old Tairrah McGriff and 23-year-old Shawntez Edmondson watched as Sahara entered the store with her car left unlocked and running.

Allegedly, McGriff got out of the sedan and followed Sahara into the

store, while Edmondson attempted to steal her car. When Sahara noticed that her car was being stolen, she confronted McGriff and the situation worsened. Brooks-White says her daughter was not afraid to confront someone if they wronged her or her family. "She was very blunt," said Brooks-White. "If you did something against her, you were going to know it. But she did everything and whatever she had to do to take care of her family, her son especially."

Sahara came face to face with the woman and a gun was drawn. Mc-

Griff was walking backwards with the gun pointed at Sahara. The attendant at the BP station recognized what was happening and ran outside to try and calm everyone down. After that, shots were fired. The BP employee, Nyla Garner, tried to help her as police arrived. "The whole time, the lady just kept saying 'please don't let me die, please don't let me die, I got a baby on the way,'" she said. Sahara was taken to the hospital and died shortly after.

From the night that law enforcement knocked on her door, Rozella Brooks-White has been trying to put the pieces back together. She says nearly a full year later she still hasn't completely processed what happened. "I'm not thinking my baby's dead—that my baby's been killed," said Brooks-White. "Maybe a car accident or something, but not killed."

Brooks-White remembers the moment clearly when police gave her the worst news of her life. "He told

Part of the Suspect's Confession

Our Florida courts are often called upon to decide whether or not an entire document or recording should be admitted into evidence. Going back decades, courts have consistently ruled that if only a portion of a recording or document is discussed during testimony in a trial, then the other side has the option to introduce the complete document or recording so that the jury may consider the tone and contents of the entire document or recording.

In a recent Broward County case the defendant was found guilty of first-degree murder while engaged in the commission of a robbery and was sentenced to life in prison. The evidence revealed that the victim of the homicide was a 68-year-old retired man who took the 27-year-old defendant home with him from the beach. When the victim did not show up later that day for a planned dinner, the victim's friend went to his house and discovered him lying face down in the kitchen. A detective arrived at the scene and spoke to witnesses who saw the victim eating with the younger man on his back porch earlier that day. The medical examiner testified that the victim had extensive injuries to his neck consistent with pressure being applied to that area.

Law enforcement also discovered a video showing the defendant using the victim's credit card at various stores, and surveillance videos which showed the victim's car at locations where the card was used. The

Broward detectives located the defendant using his cell phone. When the Broward detective approached the defendant, they observed him in possession of a tote bag with the victim's initials on it. The detective also saw the victim's business cards, credit cards, keys, and computer inside the tote bag. The secret word is resolution.

At the trial the detective testified that the defendant initially stated he did not know the victim, and that he had bought all the items from someone on the beach. Later, he acknowledged he knew the victim, and finally told the detective how the victim had died through the application of "wrestling moves" which proved to be too forceful. The defendant admitted he then poured bleach around the kitchen and living room to cover up his presence, grabbed whatever items he could, and left in the victim's car.

The state did not introduce the entire recording of the defendant's statement to the detective, instead only eliciting statements that the defendant made which suggested his guilt in the murder and robbery charge. The trial judge ruled that if the defendant, in cross examination of the detective, elicited statements that showed his innocence, the state would be able to use the defendant's prior convictions for impeachment in front of the jury. As a result, the jury was advised of the defendant's nine prior convictions of felonies or crimes involving dishonesty.

The defendant appealed, arguing that the State was required to admit the entire video recording of the defendant's statement into evidence. Because they failed

me there was an altercation that took place at a gas station and that she was killed. I remember I kept asking him, 'are you for real? Are you for real?' I still haven't grieved yet at all and we're coming up on a whole year." Only a day earlier, she was counting down the New Year. Now she was in shock.

Her mother says Sahara was a bubbly, outgoing, and sunny, young lady. "Her son was her world and she was a good mother," she said. When she mentions her grandson, Brooks-White is reminded of Sahara as a baby. "When Sahara was born, she was 2 pounds and 1 ounce; she was born premature. And then to have your life taken prematurely...how do you grasp that? How do you process that? The first year she struggled as a baby. She eventually came through that, but then to have your life taken, so prematurely from somebody else."

Shortly after Sahara was killed, McGriff and Edmonson were both brought into custody and charged. Brooks-White is glad to know that they are off the streets, but it doesn't help her much with accepting the loss of her daughter at the hands of violent crime. "It's not easier that I know who killed my daughter, but it helps some knowing that they are in custody and going to have to face what they did to my baby. We all know that death is going to hit us at some point in time, but when it just hits you so suddenly, it knocks the life out of you."

Even with both suspects in custody, the court process has left her and her family frustrated and weary. She says she hasn't missed a single court date except for one when her mother passed away. "I feel it's important to be there even though you kind of get a little weary," she said. "You go to court time after time and the family, we're always there, but the defendant doesn't even have to come out to court."

Brooks-White feels that the victims are treated unfairly when defendant appearances are waived.

For her, it's a part of being held accountable for their actions. "They shouldn't be excused from having to come into court," she said. "We have to get up, even though we don't want to, and go to court. I think that's unfair to the family. That's the least they should make them do. It's not like she's not there—she's there in the shoe. Then lawyer sees us out there and says I'm going to waive her appearance."

Sometimes she feels ready to grieve and accept forgiveness, but when she goes to court, she can't help but feel bitter. "At some point, in order to see my baby again, I'm going to have to forgive them," she said. "But me forgiving them, doesn't mean I'll forget. When you go to court and see them, anger and bitterness, and frustration—all that just comes up all over again. If had really forgiven her, the bitterness and all that wouldn't be coming up like it's doing."

She believes stemming violence in Jacksonville could go a long way towards allowing herself to forgive the individuals that took her own daughter's life, but she knows it will take a lot of time and effort to get there. "I just look back from this year alone. Sahara was the second death of the New Year and look how many other families and people have lost their life from senseless violence. I think there needs to be something in place. We all have to be held accountable for our actions," she said.

Her message to any family that is going through a similar situation is to take it second by second. "It's not easy. It's hard," she says. "For those that believe, we have to continue to trust in God and to be around people that uplift us when we feel like we are at our weakest point."

New Year's gives us all a chance to look back, take stock and assess ourselves. It's a good time to reboot and resolve to do better. With every mention of resolutions this New Year, we should all resolve to end violent crime in Jacksonville.



to do this, his conviction should be reversed. The case went all the way to the Florida Supreme Court. The Supreme Court conceded that when a written or a recorded statement, or a part thereof, is introduced by one party, the other side may require him or her to introduce any other part of the written or recorded statement. However, the Supreme Court said that this particular law did not apply to conversations, but is limited to written and recorded statements. The Supreme Court affirmed the trial court decision because the state was not offering the recording into evidence at trial. The defendant was entitled to introduce the exculpatory portions of his own statement to the police during his cross examination of the detective. But, the defendant was not entitled to require the state to introduce the recording of the defendant's statement during its direct examination of the detective.

The defendant's conviction was affirmed by the Supreme Court. The case is Nock v. State, and was decided November 1, 2018, by the Florida Supreme Court.

You don't have to be by yourself, you don't have to go through this alone and I'm here with you through the end and beyond.'
