Stealing the copper

Many states have what is called a "uniform criminal code," which is often brief and concise, describing the various criminal offenses in general terms that could be applied to

many different factual settings. Florida is not like that. We have hundreds of criminal laws, many of them directed at very specific activity. We have statutes such as "obtaining groceries by fraud," "simulated bull fighting," "tampering with a sewer system," and "the unauthorized use of linens."

One such law is Florida's criminal statute of the theft of copper or nonferrous metals. Under this law, a person who intentionally takes copper from a utility services provider, thereby causing damage to the facilities, interrupting or interfering with the utility service, or interfering with the ability of a utility services provider to provide service, commits a felony of the first degree.

Recently, this statute was called into question. The undisputed facts in the case were that the defendant and another individual cut a hole in the locked fence surrounding an electric power substation, entered the grounds through the breach in the fence, and attempted to remove a spool of copper wire. The wire was located just inside the fence and was not connected to any equipment. The defendant and his accomplice were apprehended before they could remove the copper wire from the property.

In criminal court, the defendant pleaded no contest to attempting to commit the theft of copper and conspiracy to commit theft of copper. On appeal, the defendant argued that the facts were insufficient to sustain his conviction for the copper crimes. He argued to the appeals court that the facts in his case did not demonstrate that taking copper – the act itself - caused the damage to the facility. He asserted that moving the freestanding spool of copper wire caused no damage to the facility, and therefore, no violation of the copper theft statute occurred. It was the position of the prosecutor that the facts needed only to show that the damage to the facility occurred in the course of the

Once murdered—twice buried

It was a seasonably warm and windy Saturday morning in mid-May—a perfect spring day to be outdoors in sunny Northeast Florida; unless, of course, it is spent in a cemetery reburying your only son.

Such was the case for Catherine Ivey. Her son Richard Michael Key, a 25-year-old father of three, was gunned down and left dead on the side of the road in front of the convenience store near his house in September, 2012; a case that remains unsolved. The proprietors of the cemetery in which he was buried had done the unthinkable—dug up one of its roads and sold it off as cemetery plots for profit.

The north side cemetery was apparently operating as an unlicensed cemetery and therefore, according to its former owner, not required to

follow state codes and regulations. Richard Key was just one of the nearly 2,000 people whose bodies had to be exhumed and reburied within the appropriate areas of the cemetery.

Every day Catherine relives her last moments with her son. She reviews every detail to know what she or he could have done differently that would allow him to be alive today. Every day she tries to forget the day she watched the casket containing her son being lowered into the ground. Every day, Catherine aches with an internal pain so severe that can only be understood by those who have buried their own children. And every day, she wonders if she will ever heal.

The last thing she could have imagined was to have

her son unearthed from his resting place. It was just not in any conceivable plan she ever had to be the first in a long line of families standing with the exhumed bodies of loved ones and seeing them reburied on a beauti-

> ful weekend morning. Shopping at the farmer's market would have been so much easier. Stuck in Atlanta traffic for 18 hours in a snow storm would have been preferable. But there she was...literally reliving the most painful days of her life.

Ten years earlier, she and her little family had to relocate from Jacksonville's Westside to a neighborhood just north of town near the corner of Buckman and 30th Streets. Richard was 15 at the time and by all accounts had always been an ideal son, student, and friend. Coming from a seemingly better neighborhood, he did not easily fit into his new

school or surroundings and found making friends a challenge. He often came home frustrated that his peers did not accept him and began dressing differently to be accepted, his mother recalls.

With her wisdom and love she encouraged him to be himself, dress according to his own personality and warned him against changing for anyone else or working too hard to fit in. It wasn't long before the bullying became too much and she sent him to finish school out of the area.

According to Catherine, he had a very loving nature and spent much of his social time time talking with female friends and staying close to home where he was

The difference between murder and homicide

When you hear someone mention the murder rate in Jacksonville you bet-

a few questions. The reason you example of this would be when an should question the information is because that "rate" may not be the accurate or complete picture. You see, many get confused by the differences in what is a murder and what is a homicide. Plain and simple - all murders are homicides, however not all homicides are murder. Many times, we hear the terms "homicide" and "murder" used interchangeably, when in actuality, the circumstances can be quite different.

By definition, a "homicide" is the killing of another human being. "Murder," on the other hand, is a killing of a human being that has been deemed illegal by the Legislature.

Then you also have the term "Manslaughter," which is defined as an illegal killing. Basically, all three terms refer to the death of a human being. The big difference is the motive and manner in which the death occurred.

Under Florida law, some homiter make sure to ask cides are deemed justifiable. An individual is protecting himself from imminent danger, such as in a robbery or burglary or in a case of self-defense. A homicide can be considered excusable when the death occurs by accident or misfortune. Murder, on the other hand, is a deliberate act and is classified at many different levels. Murder in the First Degree is the highest level offense and is a capital felony. One type of first-degree murder is premeditated murder. What some may not realize is that premeditation can happen within a few seconds of time or it can be a carefully mapped-out plan. The other type of first-degree murder is called Felony Murder, which is a death that occurs during the commission of certain dangerous felonies such as robbery or sexual battery.

Murder in the Second Degree involves a death where an individual kills another human being without premeditation, but rather out of anger or with ill will or reckless disregard for human life. As for the charge of Manslaughter, it is the killing of a human being by intentional act or negligence. An example of this would be if an individual is killed by a drunk driver, that driver could be charged with manslaughter.

The smallest detail can affect what a defendant is formally charged with in a crime. This is why our prosecutors review each and every homicide case carefully. After that review, the SAO then decides which charge we believe can be proven beyond a reasonable doubt. The final determination is left up to a jury.



Police Officer of the Month

IVAN PEÑA

Ivan Peña, assigned to the International Affairs Unit (Community Affairs and Special Events Division) is recognized for being a valuable resource to the JSO Homicide Unit/Detective Division for the past several years. Sgt. Dan Janson says, "Officer Peña has developed skills that make him a viable, preferred asset to aid in homicide investigations involving Hispanics. Not only is he able to develop a rapport with victims, witnesses and suspects, he under-

stands the demands and priorities implicated in cases aforementioned. Peña displays a high degree of recognition, acceptance and prestige in dealing with others. He makes a favorable impression upon our organization and easily gains acceptance by others."

Following the murder of Sebastian Morales in May 2011, when Homicide requested Peña's assistance, he met with individuals in the Hispanic community to develop witness testimony. Information he obtained helped Detective Karen Dukes and the State Attorney's Office bring charges against suspect Eric Martin. In addition, Peña learned the suspect was targeting victims within the Hispanic community and that one victim had actually returned to his native country. Ivan assisted in locating and convincing this individual to return to Florida to help prosecute the suspect (who was sentenced to 40 years in prison).

Last April, Homicide requested Peña's assistance in the murder investigation of Rosa Garcia, who was found dead inside an apartment near San Pablo Road. Rosa was killed by her husband who then fled to his sister's residence in Palm Beach County. Detectives who traveled to Palm Beach to interview the suspect sought Peña's assistance. He was out of town on a family vacation, but he went to South Florida to meet his JSO colleagues and together they conducted the interview which led to the arrest and prosecution of the suspect who was sentenced to life in prison.

Last July, Peña assisted with the murder investigation of Jose Caballero, whose body was found in the middle of Ashley Melisse Blvd. near N. Kernan Blvd.; he provided assistance in a case where an infant was killed by the mother's boyfriend (interviewing the suspect which was beneficial in his prosecution); and, finally, Peña assisted with the investigation of an industrial accident that killed an individual in North Jacksonville (interviewing witnesses and providing assistance to OSHA).

Supervisor Sgt. David Oliver said, "Officer Ivan Peña is considered by his colleagues and the community he serves to be the pinnacle of community policing."



Police Supervisor of the Month

POLICE LIEUTENANT BRIAN KEE

Newly promoted Police Lieutenant Brian Kee, currently assigned to Zone 6 patrol, last month was assigned to the Gun Crime Unit. Commanding Officer of the Hostage Negotiation Team, he ensures negotiators are properly trained and prepared to respond with the SWAT team at a moment's notice. He is also in charge of the Critical Incident Stress Management Program. This team responds

to common critical incidents for law enforcement personnel which include, but are not limited to line-of-duty deaths, suicide of an employee, etc. Kee ensures that the affected employee attends mandatory confidential sessions designed to prevent adverse psychological and/or physical reactions.

Kee is honored for his work implementing the Gun Buyback program. Events of this nature not only create discussion and focus on gun crime in the community, but also provide an opportunity for someone possessing a firearm to turn it in <u>ANONYMOUSLY</u> to law enforcement for proper disposal. Participants receive \$50 for each firearm. Funding for these events is generously donated by the Delores Barr Weaver Fund of the Community Foundation of Northeast Florida.

To facilitate the program last May, the Gun Crime Unit was tasked with implementing a process for the operation. Kee ironed out details, created a plan of action using the Incident Command System and recruited volunteers from patrol, the SWAT Team, Narcotics and Vice Division and various other areas to work at the events.

JSO's first Gun Buyback in several years took place last June at the Elks Lodge on West Duval Street and resulted in 539 firearms turned in (payout of \$26,950) and recovery of 10 stolen handguns. Chaplain David Williams commented that it was the smoothest operation he had ever seen. In October, a second Gun Buyback at the Arlington Baptist Church on Arlington Road netted 682 firearms (12 were reported stolen). The most recent event (and most successful of the three) took place in January at the Evangel Temple Assembly of God on Ramona Boulevard, where 811 guns were purchased and three donated (11 were reported stolen).

Following each event Kee was responsible for tracking and inventory of all 2,035 weapons (this in addition to his duties as a supervisor in the Gun Crime Unit). Assistant Chief Ray Walden said, "Sergeant Kee showed true leadership by gaining the cooperative effort of several units and our community partners to make these operations a success."

Civilian Employee of the Month

SHIRLEY A. TERRELL

Clerical Support Aide III Shirley Terrell, who has worked in JSO's Civil Process Unit since 2007, is recognized for her overall approach to her duties, which include processing and providing oversight for Writs of Attachment that are given to the Civil Process Unit to execute. She works closely with the Records Unit which enters information into the Florida Crime Information Center (FCIC) database and routinely discusses with judges' judicial as-

sistants issues that may arise. And she spends a lot of time advising the petitioner of the status of service.

Last December a citizen sent the following letter to Shirley's supervisor, JSO Inventory Control Manager Mike Lamb: "When my family member was incarcerated in the Duval County jail, I needed information on what to do to purge him in this county even though Alachua County had served him and Marion County had a detainer on him. I was told one thing by Duval County and something different by Marion County and by the time I had been referred to the Civil Unit department, I was frustrated because no one seemed to be able to give me the correct information I needed until I spoke with Ms. Terrell.

"She went above and beyond her job description and helped me on her day off, while she was out of town. Her co-workers relayed a message to her and she called me personally with the information I needed. Her attitude towards me was stellar, in spite of the fact it was her day off and I truly appreciated her demeanor. As far as I am concerned, her professionalism, knowledge of information and level of service was and is outstanding. I honestly believe that everything turned out well for my family member partly due to the assistance Ms. Terrell provided and because she responded to me in a timely manner."

In addition to her regular duties Shirley also participates in fundraisers for events such as the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society's *Light the Night* event; the American Cancer's Society's *Relay for Life* walk; and the American Diabetes Association walk. Sheriff Rutherford said, "Shirley, thank you for representing JSO in such a positive light and for your continued help in educating the public about the process with these types of civil cases. Congratulations on earning this recognition; you truly exemplify the JSO Core Values of *Community Focused* and *Worthy of Trust*.



Corrections Officer of the Month

JOSHUA DASHER

Field Training Officer Joshua Dasher, assigned to Pre-Trial Detention Facility (jail), is a certified Breath Test Operator and a Dual-Certified Officer (trained as both correction and police officer). He is recognized for actions he took last year that possibly saved an individual from being seriously injured or killed.

In November, Dasher (as Intake Transportation Officer) went to get Corrections Sgt. Donna Johnson from City Hall

and transport her to the PTDF. While en route they encountered a disturbance in the road-way – two individuals blocking traffic at Main and Adams Streets. The victim was yelling that the suspect had a knife and was trying to stab him. A witness told Johnson the suspect did indeed have a knife in his hand, and Dasher could see the weapon that the suspect was attempting to conceal against his forearm.

As the victim and suspect continued to argue, Dasher saw the suspect advancing toward the victim and ordered him to drop the weapon. When the suspect did not comply, Dasher un-holstered his weapon and again commanded him to drop the knife. The suspect complied and Dasher secured the weapon and detained both men while waiting for patrol officers to arrive.

During this time the suspect admitted to Dasher that he had marijuana hidden in his shoe. When Zone 1 officers arrived at the scene, he briefed them on the situation and turned over the evidence.

Investigation revealed that the suspect claimed the victim had stolen his money, but he accused the wrong man. The victim refused to press charges, but the suspect was still arrested for drug possession and transported to jail.

Corrections Sgt. Marisa Carter said, "Officer Dasher's quick thinking and actions stopped what could have been a very serious life-threatening incident and luckily no one was injured."

entire taking and because the defendant damaged the facility by cutting a hole in the perimeter fencing, then the damage occurred in the course of and to facilitate the copper wire theft.

Just as the trial judge did, the appellate court agreed with the state's analysis and concluded that the facts as set forth above did show enough evidence to support his convictions under the copper theft statute. While it is true, the court stated, that criminal statutes are strictly construed in favor of the accused, the court did not find the language of the copper theft statute ambiguous and susceptible to the defendant's interpretation. The appellate court concluded that, under the defendant's theory, even if the defendant had driven a bulldozer through the substation security fencing to gain access to the compound, that fact would not sustain a violation of the copper theft statute because in the actual act of moving the spool of copper wire, he caused no damage. The appellate court

found such a result to be "absurd" and rejected the defendant's assertion of ambiguity in the copper theft statute.

The case is Ramsey v. The State of Florida and was decided by the First District Court of Appeals on November 6, 2013.

Protecting yourself against online data breach

Much is in the news since last fall concerning online data breach. First it was Target, now eBay. Though this is not violent crime related, it is certainly important to protect yourself and the money you work hard for.

On behalf of Floridians, Attorney General Pam Bondi recently issued a statement regarding the eBay data breach. "The magnitude of the reported eBay data breach could be of historic proportions, and my office is part of a group of other attorneys general in the country investigating the matter," Bondi said. "We must do everything in our power to protect consumers' personal information, which is exactly why I worked with the Florida Legislature on the Florida Information Protection Act."

In order to better protect consumers from data breaches, Bondi worked with the Legislature on the Florida Information Protection Act. Identity theft wreaks havoc on individuals' lives and can have long-lasting effects. This legislation will better protect Floridians' personal information by ensuring that businesses and governmental entities take certain measures to protect personal information and report data breaches to consumers. The legislation will require a 30-day notice to Attorney General Bondi's office when a significant data breach has occurred. Senator John Thrasher and Representative Larry Metz sponsored the bill, the entire Senate and House of Representatives supported it.

(Note: No federal law requires you to be personally notified of a data-related security breach.)

Meanwhile, check out the tips below and make sure you are doing all you can to protect yourself from data breaches, identity theft and credit card fraud. The secret word is sunscreen. Here's what federal fraud specialists, consumer advocates and other experts say you should do (taken from creditcards.com):

1. Look at your receipts or scan your memory and figure out what card or cards you

2. Reset the password attached to that account. This won't protect you against unauthorized use of the card at

brick-and-mortar shops, but it might help defend against a deeper magnitude of security breach if the data thief decides to poke around in cyberspace.

3. If you used a debit or ATM card, keep a close eye on the bank account attached to that card. Go online regularly for the next few weeks -- or until authorities or your bank issues an all clear -- and look for any unauthorized transactions.

4. If you find one or more unauthorized transactions, immediately notify the bank. You must contact the card issuer within 60 days of the day the questionable statement was mailed to you. Upon learning of the problem, the issuer almost certainly will tell you to cut up the card in question and it will expeditiously send you a replacement. "They just want your credit card number," Tom Shaw, vice president of financial crimes management at USAA, the financial services company that mostly serves military families, told Credit-Cards.com last year during a flurry of similar data breaches. "They are agnostic as to whose name is embedded in the magnetic stripe.'

5. Know your legal liability and move quickly. Generally speaking, your liability is limited to \$50 for unauthorized purchases made with your debit or ATM card. But time is of the essence: Under federal law, if you don't report illicit transactions within 60 days, you may be held responsible for the entire amount. In any case, when vou report an unauthorized transaction, the bank in all likelihood immediately will deactivate your debit or ATM card and arrange for you to receive

6. If you used a credit card during the period in question, go online and monitor the transactions associated with that account. Check that account frequently until authorities issue an all clear.

7. If you see anything suspicious, immediately call the credit card issuer and report the problem. In the case of credit cards, federal law also limits your liability to \$50 for any fraudulent transactions.

8. If you see unauthorized transactions on either a debit card or a credit card, also contact one of the three major credit reporting bureaus and ask it to attach a "fraud alert" to your account. This service is free, and the company must share the alert with the other two companies. The initial alert stays on your accounts for at least 90 days and will make it more difficult for a thief to open more accounts in your name. The Federal Trade Commission has details on contacting three major credit reporting companies and fraud alerts.

9. As a precaution, go ahead right now and order a free copy of your credit report. It will serve as a pre-fraud starting point in case things go south on you in coming weeks or months as a result of the recent breach or any other potential financial fraud. Federal law requires each of the three major credit reporting services to provide one free copy of your credit report every 12 months. When the report arrives, check it carefully for errors or suspicious activity.

10. In the unlikely event that the breach associated with the cards used on eBay spreads to your other accounts, you can ask each of the three credit reporting companies to put a freeze on your credit file. This makes it less likely that thieves can open new accounts in your name, but it also means that potential creditors cannot obtain your credit report. Think of it as the nuclear option and one to be used only under grave circumstances.

Bottom line: If you apply modest vigilance, employ some common sense and respond quickly to any suspicious activity regarding your accounts, you should be fine. Visit creditcards.com for more information and helpful tips.



especially close with his sister. Following his graduation from high school, he worked with his father on construction jobs. He loved his three small children and did his best to care for them, even taking care of his daughter at home while her mother was at work.

A creature of habit, Richard called his mother each night from their home and stayed up to wait for her to return from work to make sure she got in safely. In the mornings he would walk down to the corner store to and get his favorite breakfast items. It was just such a morning that September that he was standing at the counter when someone alerted him that he was wanted outside. He walked out the door of the store to his death. Some black men in a white car, reportedly an Impala or Toyota, shot him several times and fled the scene.

JSO Officer Kevin Munger (detective at the time) found during the course of his investigation that despite how the neighborhood kids had picked on him over the years, Richard was well-liked and simply did not deserve to die. He quickly became close with Catherine and her family, even taking two of her grandsons, ages 10 and 12, to the Police Memorial Building to see where he worked and out for ice cream, doing what he could to encourage them.

Catherine says no one seemed to be able to give any justifiable reason for her son's death and that it is "stupid what these young men get angry about and want to kill each other over." She is sure that someone in the neighborhood knows who did this to her son.

"I pray that someone will have the heart to come forward with any information and help solve my son's case," she said. "He just didn't deserve this."

As Father's Day draws near, she thinks of Richard's three children. His four-yearold daughter goes straight to her father's room and kisses his picture when she visits her grandmother. "He is someone they will never really know. It's so sad they will live without knowing the love and devotion he had for them and how much he wanted to be in their lives," she said.

Catherine was surrounded by friends and loved ones as she stood graveside over Richard's body for the second time and vowed to do what she could to keep his memory and the love he had for people and for his children alive in their hearts.

Family Support Services opens new facility

Making Summer a Season for Crime Prevention

Summer is traditionally regarded as a season when crime heats up.

Especially with students out of school, there are more opportunities and temptations for some to get into trouble. Some become victims of crime, too.

As always, effective law enforcement is essential, including the Sheriff's new Operation Ceasefire initiative, along with family responsibility and neighborhood vigilance. To help prevent crime, Jacksonville is also fortunate to have several initiatives to help keep young people out of trouble and engaged in positive

activities during the summer.

Mayor's Summer Jobs Program

Involving employers from the private, public and nonprofit sectors, the Summer Jobs Program provides parttime and full-time jobs for promising young people who otherwise might not have the opportunity.

In 2013 more than 600 teens received job-readiness training, coaching and real-world work experience. We're aiming for more than 800 this summer. We're also increasing the number of participating employers from the private sector.

It's far better to have our teens spending their summer on the job, learning and

Jacksonville Children's Commission Summer Camps

Each year the Jacksonville Children's Commission supports full-day, low-cost summer camp opportunities for thousands of low-income and special needs children in Duval County.

Open to children ages 5 to 15, the camps are run by nonprofit groups at various schools, parks, churches and community-based sites. In addition to sports and recreation, the camps provide academic and enrichment activities to help children reduce summer learning loss, prepare for the next school year and develop positive behaviors.

Summer Night Lights

A collaboration involving the City of Jacksonville, Jax-Parks and the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, Summer Night Lights is aimed at teens and operates at selected parks for eight weeks on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights during the summer.

The program provides a safe place for teens to gather during

summer evenings, with positive, structured recreational opportunities under the supervision of responsible adults. In 2013 and again this year, local attorney Wayne Hogan provided financial support.

Waterproof Jax

One more summer initiative to keep kids safe is Waterproof Jax. Now entering its third summer, this public-private partnership has one simple goal: to prevent accidental drowning by providing free swimming lessons to children who otherwise could not afford them.

Thanks to generous support from attorney Wayne Hogan and partner organizations like the Police Athletic League and YMCA, Waterproof Jax expects to teach at least 1,500 children to swim, more than double last summer's number. This includes 150 spots designated for children of active-duty military families. In addition, all summer school students at Woodland Acres Elementary will receive free swim lessons.

These summer initiatives demonstrate how our community is working together to promote the safety and wellbeing of our kids, helping to make summer a season for crime prevention.

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n 2012, there were nearly 70,000 "hit-and-run" accidents in Florida, 168 of which resulted in fatalities. One out of every five pedestrians killed on the road dies because of a hit-and-run. Jacksonville has been named one of the most dangerous cities in the country for pedestrians.

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Florida law requires people involved in a crash to remain at the scene, exchange information, and provide reasonable assistance to anyone injured. Those who fail to follow these guidelines are committing a crime punishable by fines, jail, and possibly lengthy prison sentences. They are also cowards. Despite these laws, and our moral responsibility to each other, hit-and-run accidents occur every day.

If you witness or are a victim of a hit-and-run accident, immediately contact law enforcement and write down any identifying characteristics of the fleeing vehicle such as make, model and color as well as license plate numbers,

Protect yourself and family with Uninsured Motorist coverage to recover damages when the at-fault driver is unknown or has insufficient

insurance coverage.

if possible. It is also important to gather witness information and determine whether surrounding businesses have cameras that captured the incident.

Victims of hit-and-run accidents will likely suffer mounting medical bills, lost wages and other potential damages while police investigate the case. Evidence expires quickly. As civil lawyers, we often work immediately with a private investigator to conduct our own

investigation in hopes of bringing the at-fault driver to justice. When that person is caught, we also act as an advocate throughout the criminal case while fighting to get our clients the recovery they deserve. Taking a prompt and proactive approach to these cases is critical, and can be the deciding factor that makes justice certain.

If you have been the victim of a hit-and-run accident, a civil lawyer can evaluate the case and let you know how they can help. Consultations are often free and most lawyers take these cases on a contingency basis, meaning you only pay the lawyer if he or she recovers some-
