## Jacksonville Observes National Victims' Rights Week April 7 - 13, 2019

very year, Jacksonville's Mayor's Victim Assistance Advisory Council observes National Crime Victims' Rights Week (NCVRW) with several events hosted by the Justice Coalition and other nonprofit agencies that assist victims and families who have been impacted by crime.



NCVRW will be commemorated this year from April 7 to 13. This year's theme—Honoring Our Past. Creating Hope for the Future.—“celebrates the progress made by those before us as we look to a future of crime victim services that is even more inclusive, accessible, and trauma-informed.”

The week will start with a kickoff at City Hall and will continue through the week with special events honoring victims of crime. The Justice Coalition will be holding its annual Tossing of the Roses at the Northbank Riverwalk between the Landing and the Times-Union Center on April 8 at 6:00 pm. At Tossing of the Roses, families of victims who have lost their lives to violent crime are given an opportunity to come together and honor their loved ones by tossing a yellow rose into the St. Johns River.

The highlight of the week will be the Victims' Rights Week Awards Luncheon where the Mayor's Victim Assistance Advisory Council will announce individuals and organizations that have gone above and beyond in their daily responsibilities to assist victims of crime.

The Mayor's Victim Assistance Advisory Council (VAAC) will sponsor the annual observation of National Victims' Rights Week in Jacksonville on April 7-13. ## Cowford Chophouse 5K Raises Money for Justice Coalition and Honors Late Director Mike Liles

In March, hundreds of athletes from across Jacksonville gathered in front of Cowford Chophouse for the annual MOO-VE IT 5K. It was a drizzly Saturday morning, but no one was discouraged. Some runners stretched and others jogged for a light warm up before the canon signaling the start went off.

Even with an overcast sky, the course offered incredible views along the north bank of the St. Johns River. To the left of the start line, on East Bay Street, the Main Street Bridge was visible over a row of palm trees. To the right was the historic block of buildings that includes Cowford Chophouse—a Renaissance Revival Landmark with restored elements that include arched windows, exterior bricks, metal cornice, and 300-year-old heart of pine lumber.

About 10 minutes before the start, the sun began to poke through the clouds, and runners began to congregate at the start line. At 10:00 am the canon echoed through Downtown Jacksonville and the runners were off. Andrew Smith was the first to cross the finish line with a time of 19:07 and the first female finisher, Amelia Williams, was



right behind him with a time of 19:36.

After about an hour, nearly everyone had completed the race. Runners were greeted at the finish line with local beer and food. Countless finisher medals dangled and gleamed in the morning sunlight as everyone enjoyed the friendly post-race atmosphere. It was a beautiful event that went towards promoting a great cause and honoring a great man.

In September of 2018, the Justice Coalition received the exciting news

that it had been selected by Cowford Chophouse to be the recipient partner for the 3rd annual MOO-VE IT 5K. The funds from this race exceeded \$11,000, and as a result, our Victims' Advocate newspaper was able to go back into print again. We at the Justice Coalition feel blessed that this incredible event was also held in remembrance of our late executive director Michael J. Liles.

## Hazing

In recent years, many states have passed statutes criminalizing certain kinds of “hazing.” Typically, these new laws defined hazing as an action that was reckless or intentional in nature and one which resulted in some kind of physical or psychological injury. The Florida legislature did the same, and those new hazing statutes have now found their way to the ultimate legal authority in our state, the Florida Supreme Court.

In a recent appeal, the defendant was convicted of hazing in an Orlando case that tragically resulted in the death of a college student. The defendant appealed his conviction, arguing that the hazing statutes were invalid because they were too vague and loosely worded and because they violate the free speech rights of the accused to participate in certain types of school activities.

The defendant was a member of the percussion section of the university's marching band. Members of the percussion section rode to away events in a motor coach known as “Bus C.” The defendant was president of Bus C. A tradition known as “crossing Bus C” existed at the

University for some time. The ritual consisted of three components including the participant crossing from the front of the bus to the back while other students slapped, kicked, and punched the participant. The defendant, as president, decided when someone could cross Bus C.

The victim was also a band member and, following one of the band's performances, he participated in the crossing of Bus C. The victim was the last to cross. When he made it to the back of the bus, he appeared tired but indicated to the others, “I'm good.” After the crossings were completed, everyone left the bus except the victim. One of the other students found him in the back of the bus panicking; and, shortly thereafter, he passed out. He was taken to a local hospital but efforts to save his life were not successful. The medical examiner noticed unevenness in the skin on his torso, suggesting swelling. Based upon her further investigation, she determined that the manner of death was homicide.

Florida defines hazing as any action or situation that recklessly or intentionally endangers the mental or physical health or safety of the students for purposes of admission to or affiliation with any organization operating under the approval of a college. It includes any brutality of a physical nature, such as whipping, beating,

was his understanding of the intricacies and flaws within the justice system—especially when it came to victims and their rights. One of our primary services at the Justice Coalition is educating innocent victims of violent crime about their rights and offering them guidance through the entire legal process from beginning to end. Mike’s own experience positioned him to help countless people in this regard.

In July of 1993, Mike’s wife, Debbie Liles, was brutally attacked and beaten by a twelve-time convicted felon named Curtis Head. Head was previously sentenced to 30 years for three counts of armed robbery in 1980. In 1986, Head escaped from prison and three additional years was added to his sentence. In addition, he had another 13 years added on since he was on probation at the time of his robberies. This added up to 46 years in total.

As Mike sat through the trial of Curtis Head, he was shocked to learn that in the eyes of the state of Florida, Head had been credited with serving 46 years in the 13 years from his conviction in 1980, to the home invasion attack on his wife in 1993.

Head was sentenced to life in prison following the attack on Debbie, but Mike was not satisfied knowing the attack could have been prevented had Head served at least 85% of his sentence.

In March of 2017, Mike’s life was turned upside down in the worst way possible once again. As he returned home from work, he found that Debbie’s car was missing. He thought maybe she had left briefly to run an errand. He entered his Panama Park home and found that it had been burglarized. The TV was missing and various items had been tossed around the house. He stepped into the kitchen and saw that Debbie had once again been attacked. This time she did not survive. She was killed by blunt force trauma to her head from a golf club.

Only a month after the attack, Mike vowed to help victims. He joined, the Justice Coalition as executive director, and with all his effort he continued doing what he did best: he helped people. He became a victim advocate in every sense. He attended trials, spoke at candlelight vigils, raised funds for victims and always had his office door open for any victim that just wanted to talk.

Mike got the news that we would be partnering with Cowford shortly before he passed away. He was elated that such a prominent and respected establishment was an ally for innocent victims of violent crime. In his last Victims’ Advocate column he wrote, “I had the opportunity to meet with the Cowford Chophouse, Operations Coordinator, Nicole White alongside Robert Bracewell our esteemed Chairman of the Board. I was having lunch while sharing with Ms. White the tremendous work we do helping innocent victims of Violent Crime. Suddenly my mind seized up and I could not focus a single, intelligent thought—much less a word.

I had placed a spoonful of the Chophouse’s famous, She-Crab Soup in my mouth. It is an incredible combination of lump crab meat, tobiko caviar, micro greens and sherry. It is to die for. It truly was a flavor combination so stunning I was speechless.” “The Justice Coalition is proud to have been selected by the Cowford Chophouse to be the Recipient Partner for the Cowford Chophouse Annual MOO-VE IT 5K Fundraiser set for next year!,” he continued.

branding, exposure to the elements, forced consumption of any food, liquor, drug, or other substance, or other forced physical activity that could adversely affect the physical health or safety of the student. Subjecting the student to extreme mental stress, such as sleep deprivation, forced exclusion from social contact, forced contact that could result in extreme embarrassment, could also qualify as hazing.

In ruling, the Supreme Court noted that the victim’s consent is not a defense to the crime of hazing. The court rejected the defendant’s claim that the definition of hazing was vague, declaring that because the victims were beaten repeatedly, the defendant’s participation in the episode violated the plain terms of the statute. The court ruled that the focus of the criminal hazing statute undoubtedly is on physical harm and the risk of physical harm. Any impact on freedom of speech or expressive conduct in the student activities is insubstantial and purely incidental to the purpose of preventing physical harm. The Supreme Court decided that the “competition” of crossing Bus C was not similar to normal athletic competitions at the college level. The court ruled that the statute was not ambiguous and was enforceable. The defendant’s convictions for felony and misdemeanor counts of hazing were affirmed. The case is Martin v. State and was decided by the Supreme Court of Florida on December 13, 2018.

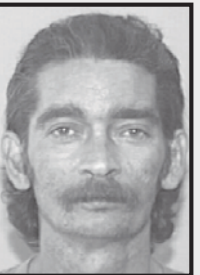

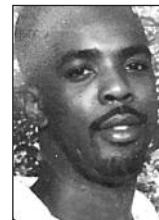
