Melissa Nelson: "Tough but Fair"

Following a tough, eight-month campaign, Florida-native Melissa Nelson will begin work as the Fourth Judicial Circuit State Attorney, bringing with her a "tough but fair" philosophy and a genuine desire to improve the criminal justice system in Duval, Nassau, and Clay Counties.

Growing up in Tallahassee, Nelson was inspired by her father's 39 year career in law-enforcement. Her father entered community service as a sheriff's deputy and left as a U.S. Marshal—a fact that Nelson proudly highlighted on the campaign trail. "I have a great appreciation and respect for law enforcement," she said in a

July debate while speaking on her father's background. Her genuine appreciation for law enforcement went a long way with voters, even with a long list of endorsements for the incumbent, including one from Jacksonville Sheriff Mike Williams. She also believes she benefitted from the wisdom of her grandfather, a WWII veteran.

Nelson's deep-rooted respect for law enforcement is balanced with an understanding and fair-minded approach to all sides of the justice sys-



tem—for some, a perceived departure from the previous State Attorney's Office. A hallmark of Nelson's campaign was her desire to devote more of the state attorney's focus on prevention and rehabilitation. This is

what she calls impacting public safety on the back end, that is, equipping individuals transitioning back into society from prison with the best possible chance of not repeating their mistakes. Working with non-profits and implementing programs aimed at reducing recidivism rates could go a long way towards improving the

justice system by preventing individuals from re-entering the system. Exploring non-traditional ways to improve public safety, Nelson believes, is a softer approach that can impact the community in a positive way going forward.

In June of last year, Clay Today noted Nelson's fond memories of long walks she had with her grandfather along a stable near her home in Tallahassee and the lessons learned from them. She was quoted as saying, "Those were life lessons on those walks. Much of my character and the way I live my life comes from lessons I learned from him." She feels that the seeds for her "tough but fair" philosophy were planted during this time. In the same article she went on

to say, "He [her grandfather] wrote me a letter and told me to never ever lose respect for the awesome power that my signature now held to change the trajectory of a life." Early on, Nelson

recognized the powerful affect she could have on peoples' lives and responded by developing a balanced and sensible approach to law that would follow her through her career.

At the University of Florida Nelson obtained her Bachelor's degree

Warrantless Entry in an Emergency

Our Florida appellate courts often wrestle with the circumstances surrounding a warrantless search of the defendant's premises. One of the justifications for a warrantless search is a genuine emergency. Just what constitutes a genuine emergency that will satisfy the legal requirements for a warrantless search is ultimately up to our courts.

In a recent case, law enforcement officers were dispatched to the defendant's residence to investigate an alleged kidnapping based on a 911 call where the caller told the 911 operator that a woman was "being held hostage" in the defendant's house. When the first officer got to the house, he heard the 911 caller telling another officer that the defendant grabbed her friend by the neck as she was exiting the defendant's house, and thereafter, the defendant dragged her back into the house against her will. During the incident, the 911 caller could hear her friend screaming for her, and she called 911 because she was afraid for her friend's safety.

Because the defendant had two large pit bull dogs pre-

venting access to the front door, the police called the defendant from a neighbor's house. After placing approximately 20 unanswered phone calls, 10 minutes had elapsed, and the officers continued to fear for the victim's safety. So the officers entered the property from the rear and knocked on the back door of the defendant's house. Two minutes after they knocked on the back door, the defendant, clad only in boxer shorts, opened the door and stepped outside with his hands up. At that point, one of the officers heard a female screaming for help from inside the house.

The defendant was detained. The police entered the house and headed in the direction where the screens were coming from. As they made their way to the victim, one of the officers observed narcotics and ammunition in plain view.

The officers found the victim lying naked in a fetal position on the bathroom floor crying and saying, "please help me, please help me." A female officer was called into the house to assist the victim, and a protective sweep of the house was conducted. The trial judge found that, based on the totality of the circumstances, the officers' entry into the defendant's property and into the defendant's residence was due to the emergency situation that existed. One Year Later: Remembering Aiden McClendon

January 29th marked the one year anniversary of the shooting death of 22-month-old Aiden McClendon. That day remains one of the most difficult and painful of my career.

As I joined the sheriff, state attorney and other community leaders to address the media that day, I expressed anger and frustration with the senseless violence in our city, and my resolve to do more to ensure that not one more young life is lost.

When I think about that smiling young boy, filled with so much innocence and optimism, I feel that pain again. This violence is not a Northside issue or an Eastside issue, it's a Jacksonville issue. These children are all of our children. No parent, in any part of our city, should have to bury his or her child due to senseless and cowardly acts of violence.

Since before this tragic loss, and even more after, we are taking many steps toward improving public safety in Jacksonville.

We secured an additional \$1 million for increased police overtime, and passed two budgets that added 80 new police and 80 new community service officers. JSO reports that the additional manpower in high crime areas contributed to a

decline in the frequency of non-domestic gun violence.

We continued our investment in crime prevention and intervention efforts with the Jax Journey, focusing on data-driven efforts targeting our most vulnerable communities, serving youth and ex-offenders. We will maintain this commitment in the years ahead.

We have made progress, but we must do more as a community to stem the tide of violence.

I will never forget Aiden McClendon. His young life, and those of so many other victims, serves as a constant reminder to work as hard as I can to ensure this does not happen in our city.

As citizens, we should be motivated to come together and take action to improve public safety. There are many ways to get involved. You can volunteer to mentor at-risk youth, or coach a youth sports team. You can start a neighborhood watch or join a Sheriff's Advisory Committee for your neighborhood. You can support programs and organizations that work with at-risk youth or ex-offenders. You can help fight neighborhood blight and host a cleanup on your street.

The important part is that we all do something, that we all ask ourselves what Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. called, "life's most persistent and urgent question, 'what are you doing for others?'" Let's take ownership of this community-wide issue and take actions to solve it. We must do this. Let's commit to our children and to our city's future.

and then her J.D. from the University of Florida Levin College of Law. After graduating from law school in 1997, she began her career working for the State Attorney's Office, trying misdemeanor crimes. Eventually, she was working high-profile homicide cases—most notably the double ax-murder trial of Jason Simpson in 2007 which resulted in the death penalty. After 12 years in criminal litigation, Nelson moved on to commercial litigation working for the prestigious international law firm McGuireWoods, where her practice focused on Title XII and Title IX claims, as well as white-collar criminal defense. Along the way, Nelson earned the respect of her peers and began to gain public exposure.

For Nelson, fairness within the justice system goes both ways. She shows sincere empathy for victims and recognizes that the accused are not the only ones that possess rights. "My entire legal career has been filled with experiences that helped me understand supporting victims," she told the Justice Coalition. "I was an assistant state attorney for 12 years. I've seen parents reeling from the loss of a child. Families mourning their loved ones lost to violence. In private practice I represented victims, often pro bono, in some extremely difficult and emotional cases."

Nelson also says that the framework for a victim support system will be available in the State Attorney's Office. "We have more than a dozen victims' advocates and over 100 attorneys who are there every step of the way communicating with people as they seek justice," she said. "Part of the mission of the State Attorney's Office is to ensure victims of all crimes have compassionate, professional guides to help them through what is often an extremely emotional period in their lives."

At the Justice Coalition, our guiding principle is advocacy and support for innocent victims of violent crime, as well as including Victim Advocates who are ready to serve these victims with time, compassion and constant court representation to help guide them through the judicial system. We believe that these victims deserve the full support of the justice system behind them. We have been especially grateful to have the support of the previous State Attorney's Office and we believe that Mrs. Nelson and her office will continue that relationship. "Treating people with a high level of care and respect is part of who I am and what this office believes, she told us. "That dedication won't change."

Police Supervisor of the Month

Lieutenant Keith A. Clement

Clement is assigned to work patrol in Zone 2, which includes the Arlington and Mayport areas of the city. On a regular basis he reviews the data generated by JSO crime analysts and properly deploys officers to address emerging patterns and trends.

In late July, Clement and his officers responded to an auto burglary in progress on Assisi Lane. He was one of the first to arrive and noticed four suspects fleeing from the scene. He was able to detain the suspects while he waited for the other officers to arrive. As a result of detaining the suspects, several stolen items were recovered and the suspects were arrested.

Another example of Clement's outstanding work occurred in August when he noticed a car on the Arlington Expressway swerving in and out of traffic lanes. Concerned for the well-being of everyone on the road, he pulled the car over.

As he approached the car, he could smell a light odor of marijuana and noticed that the occupants appeared to be nervous. He questioned the driver who admitted to drinking two alcoholic beverages earlier in the evening, but refused to give consent for Clement to search his car.

Lt. Clement requested assistance from the K-9 Unit and more specifically asked for a certified narcotics detection dog to be brought to the scene. The K-9 alerted the officers to a presence of a narcotic odor coming from the suspect's vehicle.

This gave probable cause to search the vehicle. As a result, they found a backpack containing 48 grams of marijuana, more than 67 grams of THC oil and other items containing THC. In addition to the narcotics, Clement and his officers seized more than \$31,000 in cash. All three suspects were arrested and charged with possession of marijuana with intent to sell.



Corrections Officer of the Month

Lisa M. Irre

Irre is assigned to work at the Montgomery Correctional Center, where she is the Canine Training Coordinator and she is trained in "Thinking 4 A Change." As a trainer she helps teach positive cognitive skills to inmates.

In addition, she works with the Jacksonville Re-Entry Center which offers reintegration services such as housing, bus passes, resume assistance, job placement and other beneficial programs to assist with the difficult transition into lawful and productive society.

In her role as the Canine Training Coordinator, Irre is responsible for maintaining the program called: "A New Leash on Life." She also assisted in developing the program at the prison. "A New Leash on Life," teaches inmates how to train dogs by using positive reinforcement techniques. In turn, it reduces the likelihood of these animals being euthanized because they are trained and more adoptable. Currently, 68 inmates and 70 dogs have completed the program and there is a 100% adoption rate.

Additionally, Irre has ensured that the program operates at no cost to JSO—made possible through the strong relationships that she has developed with local non-profit organizations such as First Coast No More Homeless Pets and Pit Sisters Rescue.



Reserve Officer of the Month

Dominick Raices

Raices is a member of the Police Reserve Unit and as with all JSO Reservists, he volunteers his time.

During his day job, when he is not volunteering, Raices previously served as the Chief Financial Officer of Proficient Auto Transport. Since the beginning of October he now serves as the Chief Financial Officer of WE Insure Group.

This year, he has worked more than 300 hours as a ROMEO officer in Zone 4 on the west side of the city. The ROMEO Unit was designed to keep officers on the street and utilize Reserve Officers to help transport suspects to jail.

In addition to his ROMEO assignments, this year Raices has volunteered 150 hours to riding in patrol alongside a Police Officer. During



Police Officer of the Month

Detective Jason L. Richmond

Richmond is assigned to work in the Patrol Division where he works on the Organized Retail Crime Task Force. This means that he investigates organized crime which includes retail crime rings and professional shoplifting.

In 2016, Richmond began investigating a case that involved the theft of large quantities of merchandise from a home improvement store on the south side of the city. While conducting several hours of surveillance, he was able to identify how they were stealing the merchandise and turning it into profit, and more importantly who the suspects were.

His investigation also uncovered that the same suspects from this case were involved in thefts from numerous other stores throughout Duval County. In addition, they were also targeting one specific home improvement store chain in Duval and Clay Counties.

Ultimately, Jason arrested five suspects and was able to obtain confessions from four of the suspects. The suspects were charged with 18 first degree felonies, 29 second degree felonies, and 12 third-degree felonies.

In addition, these individuals had been involved in this organized retail crime ring for six years and they had stolen more than one-million dollars' worth of merchandise.



Corrections Supervisor of the Month

Sergeant Kenneth R. Westberry

Westberry is assigned to work in the Immigration and Customs Enforcement Unit, also known as the ICE Unit, at the jail. He has been with the unit since its inception and has played a fundamental role in its success.

JSO participates in the Federal 287(G) program, a jail-based program that has proven very effective in removing criminal aliens from our streets. Westberry is recognized for his overall leadership and his commitment to this program and this community.

Since the program's inception eight years ago, Westberry and his team have interviewed and fingerprinted more than 14,000 foreign born inmates to determine their status in this country. Specifically, criminal aliens.

As of September of this year, more than 2,250 criminal aliens from 96 different countries met ICE's criteria and were processed for potential removal from the U.S. Some of the charges associated with these criminal aliens included more than 400 violent crimes such as murder, sexual battery, domestic violence, and child abuse. In addition, some of the arrestees had charges related to narcotics, firearms and property related crimes. More than 500 were arrested on charges of DUI.

The information gathered from the interviews has also led to federal indictments for drug trafficking, human trafficking and selling fraudulent documents.

With the help of Westberry's guidance, the JSO 287(G) Unit has become a model for this national jail-based program. For his leadership on this initiative, he was selected to sit on a training review committee to help ensure the ICE Academy teachings match JSO's operation.

In 2015, JSO's 287(G) Unit earned an overall perfect rating on its Office of Professional Responsibility program review. During this review, several areas of the 287(G) Unit were identified as "Best Practices."

these deployments he rides with a full-time officer and serves as a force multiplier.

Raices' previous workplace was also located on the Westside. Through this partnership, his previous organization, Proficient Auto Transport has made generous contributions to Zone 4 to help aide in JSO's mission "To Serve and Protect in Partnership with Our Community." This includes assisting with the restoration of the substation and establishing a stop station.

His current employer, WE Insure Group, is located in Zone 3 on the Southside of town. Raices plans to continue to serve as a Reservist in Zone 4, but will work once again to bridge a relationship between the Zone 3 officers and the local business community.



The Book Shelf

Books for Victims and Survivors

Filthy Rich by James Patterson

James Patterson is probably the most successful writer of thriller novels in the world, having sold over 300 million books. In 2016, he topped the list of highest paid writers for the third year in a row. His novels have often been made into equally successful movies, including Kiss the Girls, Along Came a Spider, and the Alex Cross series. Now, he has turned his attention to non-fiction, and in so doing he brings world attention and powerful advocacy to a subject that is an important part of the Justice Coalition's mission:

sex trafficking of minor girls. The full title of Patterson's new book is *Filthy Rich: A Powerful Billionaire, the Sex Scandal that Undid Him, and All the Justice that Money Can Buy. The Shocking True Story of Jeffrey Epstein*. The title accurately describes his thesis; it also effectively lays down a marker that he intends this book to be not only an attack on Epstein personally but also an attack on the ineffectiveness of the American justice system in dealing with sex trafficking of minors. In doing so, Patterson does a great service to the victims of this horrible practice.


Jeffrey Epstein became filthy rich in high finance. Along with wealth came many powerful friends, such as Prince Andrew, Bill and Hillary Clinton, and Donald Trump. He often entertained his rich friends at his estate in West Palm Beach. Of course, there's no crime in making a lot of money and hobnobbing with the rich and powerful. But he sometimes used his wealth to buy sex with minor girls, lots of them. Patterson describes these acts of prostitution activities in graphic detail, sometimes too much detail for the average reader. Indeed, at times this book reads like pornography. Certainly, this is not a book for minors! But the graphic detail serves to engage and confront the reader with the sordid reality of sex trafficking of minors. More importantly, it establishes a context for his portrayal of the inadequacy of the American justice system in dealing with human trafficking.

When he was caught, Epstein was given a plea bargain so that he was sentenced to only 18 months in prison. As part of his plea bargain, he was allowed to spend 16 hours a

day at his palatial West Palm Beach estate. He actually served less than 13 months of his sentence.

For sure, this was an outrageous miscarriage of justice. Why and how did it happen?

As Patterson's title states, it was the outcome of "all the justice that money can buy." He goes into much detail describing how the American justice system failed in this case, specifically how money played such a big part. Epstein hired some of the best and most expensive lawyers in the world, including Alan Dershowitz, who defended O. J. Simpson, as well as Ken Starr, the special prosecutor in the investigation and impeachment of President Bill Clinton. Epstein also spent huge sums settling civil law



suits brought by his victims.

With this book, Patterson has used his considerable power and influence as a popular writer to bring attention to an aspect of the American justice system that is at the heart of the Justice Coalition's mission. Victims of violent crimes, as well as their family members, look to the justice system to prosecute and punish the persons that carry out such crimes. When justice is not carried out,

when violent criminals are not appropriately punished, or when wealth is used to prevent prosecution or realistic punishment, the victims and their family members suffer. This is the very reason that the Justice Coalition was created, and the vital core of its mission is still to ensure justice is carried out and to assist victims and family members facing such difficult times.

Florida Supreme Court has previously held that the police may enter a residence without a warrant if an objectively reasonable basis exists for the officer to believe that there is an immediate need for police assistance for the protection of life or a substantial property interest.

In this case, the appellate court ruled that the record supported the fact that law enforcement reasonably believed that exigent circumstances existed. A 911 call was received describing an emergency situation at the defendant's house—a woman "being held hostage." The 911 caller told the police she saw the defendant drag her friend into the house, and heard her friend calling for help. The officers entered the house only after the defendant opened the door, and they heard the victim screaming for help. The Court held that these facts were more than sufficient to establish exigent circumstances warranting entry into the defendant's house. Under the circumstances, the court ruled that the officers' belief that immediate action was necessary to protect life and to prevent serious bodily injury, was reasonable. The secret word is cupid.

The name of this case is *Collado v. The State*, and was decided by the Third District Court of Appeal on December 28, 2016.

Glen Mitchell

Victim Advocate and founder of Compassionate Families Glen Mitchell, passed away at the age of 76. Mitchell was being rehabilitated for gall bladder surgery in early December when he suffered from a cardiovascular issue and died shortly after.

Mitchell began his professional career as a landscape architect in Memphis, Tennessee before moving to Florida in 1968. In 1980 he founded his own landscaping business, R. Glen Mitchell & Associates in Jacksonville. Working closely with the community as a landscape architect, Mitchell developed a perceptive understanding of the community that would later guide him as an advocate. Mitchell's life changed irrevocably in 1993 when his 14-year-old son Jeff Mitchell was tragically gunned down in a robbery attempt outside Terry Parker High School. Understandably, Mitchell struggled with anger and grief for some time after that, but ultimately channeled his emotion into making a meaningful difference in the Jacksonville community.

In 1998, Mitchell and his wife Margaret co-founded Compassionate Families, Inc. with the goal of serving and assisting those in the community who have lost loved ones through violent acts with immediate and long-term support, grief recovery assistance, and life rebuilding skills. In a 2004 Florida-Times Union interview, Mitchell talked about the impact of Compassionate Families and the importance of serving victims of violent crime. "We have

touched over 12,000 lives over the years and continued to do so," he said in that interview. "...New victims' families are being impacted every day by violence that takes one of their loved ones away. Our city is really blessed with people and organizations who serve victims of crime."



In addition to hosting annual memorials and events for victims, Mitchell and his wife also helped to create Camp Maddie, an annual three-day therapeutic camp for young survivors of homicide victims. Mitchell offered his counsel to these children and helped them to understand their grief and develop coping skills. So far, Camp Maddie has held eight sessions with 60 campers at each session.

Mitchell's fervent devotion to serving his community is best explained through the words of the countless families he touched. "Because of them [Compassionate Families] our whole direction in life has changed to where it could have been but not a positive. Now, it's all about helping other people and that's what we do, all of us as a family," says Andrea Crutchfield who lost her son Brandon Blansit to violence. Crutchfield now works as a victim advocate for the Justice Coalition.

The difference Mitchell made in the lives of these victims and their families is a permanent impression on our community. His legacy lasts in his compassion and the countless families he and Compassionate Families have helped.

“Justice Coalition has been so good to me. Lysa Telzer (victim advocate) has been with me *every time* in court and calls to help me get through all this. He was a mama’s boy. I’ve got it in the living room in a curio cabinet with the engraved Bible you also gave us, along with his papers from being an organ donor. I do take the bear out sometimes to sleep with it. And it feels so good.
