## Diverting Troubled Youth





Our staff at the State Attorney's Office is always looking for ways to assist juveniles, especially those who need to get back on the right track. Recently, our staff at the SAO took part in an event which allowed us to do that. We collaborated with a number of local agencies to hold the Jacksonville Juvenile Diversion Expungement Day at the Duval County Courthouse. We were proud to partner with State Representative Mia Jones, Chief Judge Mark Mahon, the Clerk of the Court and the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office for the day-long event.

When a troubled youth completes a juvenile diversion program, our staff at the State Attorney's Office advises the juvenile of the process to seal or expunge their record. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement is the agency which actually handles the sealing or expungement of cases and requires a \$75 fee with an application. With this event, area youth were able to send their applications to the FDLE absolutely free of charge.

More than 120 juveniles registered for the expungement event. Only juveniles with non-violent misdemeanors such as Petit Theft, Trespass and Possession of Marijuana are eligible to seal or expunge their record. The juvenile must also have successfully completed a diversion program in order to file the application.

The process to seal or expunge a juvenile's record can take up to six months to complete.

## Uncertainty and Frustration Amidst New Florida Death Penalty Ruling

In a recent 5-2 ruling, the Florida Supreme Court decided that death penalty recommendations from a jury must be unanimous. The ruling came despite a law passed by the Florida legislature earlier this year allowing the death penalty to be imposed if the jury reached at least a 10-2 conclusion.

The Florida Court ruling was in the case of Timothy Lee Hurst who viciously stabbed and murdered his Popeye's Restaurant co-worker in 1998. Hurst was sentenced to death on a split seven to five jury recommendation. His appeal went all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court which ruled in January that Florida's death penalty process was unconstitutional. It was determined that judges had too much influence in death sentencing when only the jury has that constitutional responsibility.

In an opinion concurring with the majority, Justice Barbara Pariente wrote, "Florida's extreme outlier status in not requiring unanimity in the jury's final recommendation renders the current



imposition of the death penalty in Florida cruel and unusual under the Eighth Amendment of the United States Constitution." Pariente also wrote that addressing the problem now "ensures that, for as long as death is a permissible punishment in the United States, Florida's death penalty will be constitutionally sound."

For many years, Florida has been one of the most aggressive states in pursuing the death penalty in capital cases. Since

1976, when the death penalty was re-permitted by the U.S. Supreme Court, Florida has executed 96 convicted murderers. In fact, right here in Duval County, 25 people have been sentenced to death since 2010—one of the highest numbers for any county in the United States. After last month's ruling, Florida's death penalty process has been thrown into uncertainty.

## Fighting to End Human Trafficking

With Hurricane Matthew bearing down on our east coast, and Florida under a state of emergency, we were forced to cancel our 2016 Human Trafficking Summit. Some forecasters predicted Matthew could make a loop and head back toward our state. We could not ask our hundreds of attendees and guests to face the potential danger.

While we are disheartened by the cancellation of the summit, we are encouraged by the response from our partners in the fight to end human trafficking. The resolve of local, state and federal law enforcement agencies, prosecutors, survivors, community leaders and service providers is as strong as ever; and we are gaining ground to-



ward our goal of making Florida a zero-tolerance state for human trafficking.

In 2012, I worked with the state legislature to strengthen Florida's laws against human trafficking. Since then, the number of cases and investigations by my Office of Statewide Prosecution has increased substantially and using the new statute hundreds more are being pursued by Florida's 20 State Attorney's Offices and the three United States Attorney's Offices in Florida.

We know we cannot win this fight alone, and I am proud to work alongside amazing prosecutors and brave law enforcement officers, as well as, the Florida Department of Juvenile

Justice, the Florida Department of Children and Families, community leaders and survivors.

Besides putting traffickers behind bars where they belong, working together we have improved training for law enforcement, developed victim recognition tools for service providers, raised awareness for parents and partnered with organizations to help end this horrific crime.

Though the goal is lofty and the task is difficult, we will continue to fight for victims of human trafficking, because saving even one life from this form of modern day slavery is worth the fight.

# Recovering from Hurricane Matthew

This month marked a new beginning for us, Jacksonville. We have experienced an event that national weather experts and our community have never seen. Hurricane Matthew is one for the books.

## Jacksonville Man Federally Charged For Receiving Child Pornography Over The Internet

Jacksonville, Florida – United States Attorney A. Lee Bentley, III announced today that Richard Daniel Lord (57, Jacksonville) has been arrested and charged in a federal criminal complaint with receiving child pornography over the Internet. He faces a mandatory minimum penalty of 5 years, up to 20 years, in federal prison, and a potential life term of supervision. His detention hearing is scheduled for October 5, 2016, at 3:30 p.m., in Jacksonville.

According to the complaint, on September 30, 2016, FBI agents executed a federal search warrant at Lord's residence in Jacksonville. During an interview with agents, he admitted that he had used his cellphones to search for, download, and view child pornography. He stated that he was most interested in images and videos of children who were between 10 and 12 years of age, that he searched for child pornography "constantly," and that he was unable to control himself. A

forensic examination of one of Lord's cellphones revealed a video that had been downloaded by Lord on September 16, 2016, depicting a child being sexually abused.

This case was investigated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. It is being prosecuted by Assistant United States Attorney D. Rodney Brown.

It is another case brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative launched in May 2006 by the Department of Justice to combat the growing epidemic of child sexual exploitation and abuse. Led by United States Attorneys' Offices and the Criminal Division's Child Exploitation and Obscenity Section, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state, and local resources to locate, apprehend, and prosecute individuals who sexually exploit children, and to identify and rescue victims. ## Police Office of the Month

David J. Sosnowski

Sosnowski is currently assigned to work patrol in Zone 1. He is recognized for his investigative work while assigned to the Narcotics Unit.

On March 16, an Army Veteran who was suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) died due to an overdose of what was believed to be fentanyl mixed with another substance. It was later confirmed by the Medical Examiner that the victim died from an acute combination of cocaine, fentanyl and acetyl fentanyl.

Following the death, Sosnowski's supervisors assigned him to assist the Homicide Unit in an effort to strengthen the case on the narcotics dealer who was suspected of selling the victim the lethal dose.

Sosnowski started his investigation by obtaining the victim's cell phone from the family. The device was still receiving text messages being sent from drug dealers. According to the text messages, a dealer who only identified himself by a single name sold the victim heroin and was in contact with the victim just prior to his death.

After making this discovery, Sosnowski corresponded with the dealer via text messages all while pretending to be the victim. He was eventually introduced to the main dealer. During the meeting, he purchased narcotics from the dealer and was able to get this transaction captured on video.

Then on May 10, he setup another deal with the supplier. During this transaction the dealer was taken into custody for trafficking heroin, crack cocaine, MDMA and oxycodone. In addition, the dealer's real identity was revealed.

Sosnowski distinguished himself once again in the month of May, when he received a tip about a possible marijuana grow house in Jacksonville. He and detectives from the Florida Department of Law Enforcement went to the target location. While at this location, the detectives were able to smell the strong odor of marijuana coming from the structure.

Detectives also made contact with the tenant of the structure who gave the detectives consent to search the residence. The detectives searched the structure and found a large grow operation which had more than 1,650 plants.

Sosnowski, along with one of our Narcotics teams, seized the plants and two suspects were arrested for Trafficking in Marijuana.

The Lieutenant in the Narcotics Units said, "This level of dedication is exhibited by Detective Sosnowski on a daily basis. His efforts exemplify the Sheriff's Office Core Values of being Community Focused, and Always Improving. He is an asset to the Sheriff's Office."



## Civilian Employee of the Month

Robert Yabut

Yabut is a Senior Analyst in our Budget and Management Division. He is recognized for going above and beyond in his roll and identifying a billing discrepancy and seeing it through to its resolution.

In 2011, when the responsibilities for the commissary accounting system were transferred to Yabut, there were a number of outstanding transactional and operational issues.

Yabut worked to clear the backlog of needed entries, caught up on the payments, corrected existing errors, brought the bank reconciliations up-to-date, as well as worked to streamline the workflow.

During his analysis of the accounts, he discovered overbilling on specific items. He then worked to identify the scope of the billing discrepancies and calculated that the vendor owed the department more than \$15,000.

After discussions with the vendor, and providing them with his account reconciliation data, the billing issue was resolved and they agreed to submit the refund. In November of 2015 the refund check was received and deposited. Currently there are no billing issues with this vendor.

His supervisor said, "thank you for your dedication to this agency and for your professionalism handling this issue and seeing it through to a successful conclusion."

# Hubbard House Urges Community to Take Action Against Domestic Violence

Hubbard House hosted the 22nd Annual Barbara Ann Campbell Memorial Breakfast last month to raise awareness of the effects of domestic violence in the Jacksonville community. Nearly 700 community leaders were urged to take action to bring about social change.

Speakers included Ellen Siler, Hubbard House CEO, Bob Baldwin, President of the Hubbard House, Inc. Board of Directors, and three survivors of domestic violence. The annual breakfast is named to honor the life of Barbara Ann Campbell, sister-in-law to former Jacksonville Mayor Jake Godbold, who was killed by her husband of 38 years in 1995.

One survivor of domestic violence explained that she was once so desperate to escape the domestic violence situation at home that she considered living under a bridge. Instead, she turned to Hubbard House: "Because of Hubbard House, I am still alive, and I have a life to live instead of contemplating the bridge."

Hubbard House offers an emergency shelter and 24-hour hotline to assist victims and their children. Last year, Hubbard House provided nearly 39,000 days of shelter and answered more than 4,500 hotline calls.

"At Hubbard House, we are working every day toward the vision of — Every Relationship Violence Free. Will we see this radical social change in our lifetimes? It's possible, if we keep working together," said Siler. "If we each leave here and find a way to involve more people and do even more."

Siler also noted that domestic violence is more likely to turn deadly when there is no intervention, comments that were validated by the recent release of the Domestic Violence Fatality Review 2015 Report. The secret word is gobble. In Duval County, there were six intimate partner homicides. None of the suspects, all male, had prior criminal records for domestic violence with their murdered partners, and none of the victims, all women, had availed themselves of domestic violence related services or shelter.

In her speech, Siler underscored the need for intervention and the danger victims often face when they decide to leave their abuser. "In two of the cases, the victims were planning to leave their situations and in one case the victim was packing to leave when she was shot and lived, but her infant twins and her father were killed," Siler said. "Leaving can be a very dangerous time, which is why shelters are so very important."

For 40 years Hubbard House has offered life-saving services to local domestic violence victims and their children. In addition to emergency shelter and hotline, Hubbard House offers a wide range of community outreach services, including group and individual support programs for adults, children and teens throughout the community and school-based prevention programs for children and teens.

"Victims in our community would have nowhere to turn if it weren't for Hubbard House. For the sake of these men, women and children, we must do everything we can do to support Hubbard House," said Bob Baldwin, President of Hubbard House's Board of Directors.

The breakfast is presented by the Endowed \$10,000 Event Grant Fund established in 2015 by Delores Barr Weaver, the Green Family Foundation, Hubbard House Foundation, Jacksonville Jaguars Foundation, Paula & Jim Liang and Mrs. James S. Taylor. All funds raised at the event support Hubbard House's programs and services year-round.

## FBI Jacksonville Announces Results of Operation Cross Country X

The Federal Bureau of Investigation-Jacksonville Division announced that one minor was rescued, and 27 adult prostitutes and three pimps and their associates were arrested as part of Operation Cross Country X, which took place in Jacksonville and Pensacola from October 13 to 15, 2016.

Operation Cross Country is an annual nationwide effort to combat underage human trafficking. This was the 10th and largest iteration of the FBI-led initiative, which took place in 106 cities across the United States and, for the first time, in several countries around the world.

The FBI Jacksonville Division operation included the cooperation of multiple state and local law enforcement partnering agencies including the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Jacksonville Sheriff's Office, Escambia County Sheriff's Office, Pensacola Police Department, Gulf Breeze Police Department, Panama City Police Department, and the Panama City Beach Police Department.

"Operation Cross Country aims to shine a spotlight into the darkest corners of our society that seeks to prey on the most vulnerable of our population," said FBI Director James Comey. "As part of this effort, we are not only looking to root out those who engage in the trafficking of minors, but, through our Office of Victim Assistance, we offer a lifeline to minors to help them escape a from a virtual prison no person ever deserves."

Operations took place in a number of locations, including hotels, truck stops, and street corners. Minors recovered during an arrest are connected with state protective services and victim assistance. Depending on the level of need, a law enforcement officer and, if available, an FBI Victim Specialist will accompany the survivor to obtain these services. Any adult arrested pursuant to state charges will be processed by state and local law enforcement partners assisting in Operation Cross Country.

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The Justice Coalition was founded in 1995, when one man's priorities were changed. Ted Hires was the average businessman working 60 to 80 hours a week and looking out for himself until the day when he and his staff were robbed at gunpoint. As a victim of a crime, Ted found the criminal justice system worked harder for the criminal than the victim. As a result of his experience, Ted formed a (501(c)(3)), non-profit organization, Justice Coalition, which continues Ted's mission of assisting innocent victims of violent crimes in the Fourth Judicial court system. Since 1995, the Justice Coalition has been fighting crime every step of the way. Fugitives captured are through a partnership with local law enforcement agencies, the media, and citizen involvement.

# Reliability of the Detection Dog

In a 2013 Bay County case the defendant appealed his judgment and sentence for possession of cannabis with intent to sell, arguing that the trial judge made a mistake in denying his motion to suppress the evidence obtained in the search of his vehicle. The search was based upon a police dog alert. These K-9 unit searches are now a regular part of police, airport and bomb detection activities. When challenged, the prosecutors must prove to the Court that the search was justified by the reliability of the detection dog.

In this case the state presented the testimony of the supervisor of the K-9 Unit, and the testimony of the deputy who served as the handler for the dog named Argos. The state presented the records relating to the dog's training and his performance history through these two witnesses. Argos had been trained to detect the odor of marijuana, cocaine, heroin, and methamphetamine. According to the Sheriff's office, an activity report for a po-

lice dog is generated every time the dog's paws come out of the K-9 Unit truck, and Argos had approximately 380 detection reports at the time of the defendant's arrest. During the narcotics detection in this case, the deputy deployed Argos to conduct a "free air search" (a sweep) around the defendant's vehicle. Argos first alerted to the driver's door when he put his nose on the door handle and quickly sat, as he has been trained to do when he detected narcotics. The deputy and Argos continued their sweep of the vehicle and when Argos approached the trunk area, he quickly sat as an alert.

The showing the state must make to establish probable cause for a warrantless search of a vehicle based on a drug-detection dog's alert to the vehicle involves the court's determination of the legal issue of probable cause.

The Supreme Court of the United States has determined that the test for probable cause is not reducible to a precise definition or quantification. A police officer has probable cause to conduct a search when the facts available support a reasonable belief that contraband or evidence of a crime will be found. Under the Supreme Court's "common-sensical standard," Courts are directed to consider the totality

of the circumstances. The Supreme Court has concluded that "a sniff is up to snuff" when all the facts surrounding a dog's alert, viewed through the lens of common sense, would make a reasonably prudent person think that a search would reveal contraband.

The appellate court concluded that the record in this case demonstrated a reasonable basis to support a finding of probable cause. The certification that Argos had received, his weekly training, and the fact that his field performance reports revealed a 90% success rate were significant. The court noted that no search of the vehicle was performed until Argos completed the entire sweep around the vehicle, and in the process of that sweep, Argos not only detected drugs on the car door handle, but also detected drugs in the trunk area of the vehicle, where the drugs in this case were discovered. The court concluded that under the totality of circumstances standard for probable cause, Argos sniff was up to snuff, and the trial court did not err in denying the defendant's motion to suppress.

The case is *Bennett v. State*, and was decided by the First District Court of Appeal on May 6, 2013.

Supreme Court, requiring a unanimous recommendation by the jury, brings us in line with the majority of the other states that have the death penalty," says Jacksonville attorney Jay Howell. "Florida Courts have repeatedly requested that our Legislature re-write the rules and now they will be forced to do so." Trials could proceed, but most likely won't be able to enter the death penalty phase until the new jury instructions are written and put into place.

As a result of these forthcoming rule changes, many questions surrounding the death penalty process remain unanswered. The ruling immediately affects 385 prisoners currently on death row. While their ultimate fate is unclear, the decision may allow for re-sentencing hearings in many cases and halt others that haven't yet reached the death penalty phase.

"The Courts may review and even retry some of the existing death penalty sentences," says Howell. "We may see death penalty cases delayed as the new laws and instructions are created. The trial courts are likely to delay the cases rather than proceed under a cloud of uncer-

tainty." In addition, prosecutors may be less likely to seek the death penalty given the toughening of the burden of proof.

The most unfortunate consequence of the ruling may be the toll that it will take on the families of the victims. Justice Coalition Senior Advocate Lysa Telzer has been following the situation closely for months. The ruling not only affects many of the victims she helps, but also her in the case of her own mother-in-law. "I have been in contact with some of the families involved," she said. "They've known for the last several months—since this Supreme Court issue has come about. I have kind of prepared them and forewarned them to expect a continuance."

The ruling has essentially slowed the whole process to nearly a stand still. "Many families can't move forward—they can't get past their horrific situation because they haven't gotten to trial yet," Telzer said about the ruling. "So, they're having continuance after continuance after continuance and they're just kind of frozen right now."

For families facing the possibility of new sentencing, the fear of being re-victimized is a very real concern. The deci-

sion may force families to re-live the pain and suffering by sitting through additional court proceedings and facing the individual that took their loved one away from them. "I'm re-victimized because I will possibly have to go through it again," Telzer said.

The ruling marks a major shift in how the death penalty will be pursued in future cases. For the victims, the changes and reversals make an already difficult situation more frustrating. "It wouldn't matter to me one way or the other, but they need to do it or don't," said Telzer. "People on death row can be there for 20, 40, pretty much a whole life time and not die and that does a disservice to the consequences of the penalty."

To be sure, the death penalty remains a controversial subject. While legalities and rules are being hashed out, the victims involved are left to cope with something that is completely out of their control. Once again, the rights of the victims seem to be secondary to those of the criminals. For them, the road seems unending. Hopefully a final resolution will be reached soon.


## Books for Victims and Survivors

### Gone Girl

Author: Gillian Flynn

Mystery novels have always been a window into the ways that popular culture engages concepts of basic justice. Edgar Allan Poe (*The Murders in the Rue Morgue*) and Sir Arthur Conan Doyle (Sherlock Holmes series) developed the original elements of mystery fiction over a hundred years ago: suspects, clues, a brilliant detective, and the inevitable plot-twist ending. Later on, such great mystery writers as Dashiell Hammett (*Maltese Falcon*) and Raymond Chandler (*Farewell, My Lovely*) created and perfected hard-boiled detectives who were not such admirable persons themselves but who stuck to their own sense of honor and justice. Perhaps the biggest theme in mystery novels in recent years has been the so-called "girl" mysteries about highly imperfect women characters who have highly conflicted relationships with men. The crime at the heart of these novels is the abuse, or supposed abuse, of the women characters by men. As such, the "girl" mysteries



provide insight into the complex nature of domestic abuse, perhaps as only literature can do.

The current "girl" mystery genre started with *The Girl with the Dragon Tattoo* by the late Swedish writer, Stieg Larsson. More recently, women authors have written huge best sellers in this genre, most notably *Gone Girl*, by Gillian Flynn, and *The Girl on the Train*, by Paula Hawkins. Both of these books have been turned into highly successful movies. (For the few people reading this who have not read these books or seen the movies, I will not spoil the

endings!)


In *Gone Girl*, Flynn uses multiple points of view and multitudinous plot twists to depict a husband and wife who detest each other and who take relationship games to the ultimate level. The wife disappears and the husband is the chief suspect. For their anniversary, she has left clues that may be only related to a marital game, or may be clues to her whereabouts. Is he the killer or is he himself the real victim? Is she even really dead? This novel brilliantly depicts the complexity of spousal abuse in completely surprising ways. As the chief suspect, the husband is an imperfect husband and his behavior is suspicious. He's having an affair and he hides activities that could be evidence of murder. To the outside world, he is the obvious culprit. But he presents himself as the victim of his wife's hideous game-playing. The ending, which as promised won't be revealed here, is worthy of the mystery genre in its best form. It's enough to note that the reader may be left stunned at the self-perpetuating nature of some abusive relationships.

### The Girl on the Train

Author: Paula Hawkins

In *The Girl on the Train*, Paula Hawkins also uses multiple points of view. Rachel, the eponymous heroine, is a divorcee who believes she witnesses evidence of a murder while riding a commuter train to work one morning. She is a highly unreliable witness because she has become a depressed alcoholic since her divorce; she is so disoriented that she doesn't even trust her own observations. She is alienated from society and judged harshly by others who are judgmental about her character. As often happens in cases of domestic abuse, her husband seems like a good guy. Even she believes she was the cause of their breakup. But two other women, who also serve as narrators, eventually come to Rachel's assistance. The ending of *The Girl on the Train* is more conventional and morally satisfying than *Gone Girl* because, as with most mystery novels, both criminal and poetic justice are finally achieved.

Sometimes, literature does a better job of depicting the complexity of human relationships than scientific studies can do. Certainly, both of these two "girl" novels vividly depict the destructive nature of domestic abuse in ways



that are not possible through scientific means. They also effectively portray the disjunct that often exists between the reality of domestic abuse and the perception of others outside the relationship, as well as the difficulty of achieving justice for victims in domestic abuse cases.

Readers of books made into movies oftentimes do not like the movies as much as they liked the books. For sure, as much as they try, the movies made of these two "girl" mystery novels sometimes lack the intensity of the written versions. And readers will note and may not like the changes in the storylines in the movie versions. Nonetheless, both movies are worth watching. They are good entertainment and more. Like the books, they serve to highlight domestic abuse as a matter for serious consideration in our culture.

## Operation Pill Drop

According to the Partnership for Drug Free Kids, prescription medications are now the most commonly abused drugs among 12 and 13 year olds, and four in ten teens who have misused or abused a prescription drug has taken it right out of their parent's medicine cabinet.

Pam tried to shoot the intruder, and after a struggle between Foster and the intruder, Foster was shot and then he in turn shot and killed the man in self-defense. There were two other defendants involved—one who pleaded guilty and another who will go to trial soon.






