Internet Cafes: Magnets for Violent Crime

Certain establishments have always been associated with the underbelly of society. It used to be the dark and dingy pub or the gentlemen's club with the tinted windows. Now it's the adult arcade. Adult arcades, formerly known as "internet cafes," have sprung up in every Jacksonville neighborhood and crime seems to follow them. You see their garish neon lights in nearly every strip mall from the Westside to the Beaches, but what isn't easily noticeable is that they are easy targets for thieves and magnets for violent crime.

City Council Member Al Ferraro is a Florida native and longtime resident of Jacksonville. He is deeply rooted in District 2, on the city's Eastside, and it's where he started his business 30 years ago. As a home and business owner, he has to come value public safety as Jacksonville's top priority and it's why he has spearheaded efforts to limit and regulate the growth of arcades with simulated gambling machines—not to shut down legitimate businesses, but to ensure that establishments that are permitted are operating ethically and under set guidelines.

"The simulated gaming machines, they constitute a public nuisance and many governments across



the state and country have recognized this," Ferraro said at a city council meeting last month. "They're public nuisances because they simulate gambling which may cause people in Jacksonville, and cause visitors to come here and think that gambling is okay. There are numerous documentations of criminal acts that occur at these facilities including murders, robberies, shootings, burglaries, car jackings, assaults, and the list goes on and on."

In some cases, internet cafes are \$100,000 a week businesses. With that much cash flow, it's easier to see why they are targeted by criminals. The secret word is hero. "What we're here for are the negative secondary effects, if you will, of these types of opera-

tions," said Deputy General Counsel Jason Teal who also spoke at the city council meeting in April. "These are high cash volume businesses and that perception is not only known to law enforcement, but also known to the criminals. So what we see out there a lot of times is that there are criminal activities at these locations that are robberies, they're assaults, shootings, car jackings, those kinds of things."

It is also known that wherever these arcades pop up, there is almost always a spike in calls to law enforcement. JSO's calls for service at known addresses with simulated gambling establishments are in the thousands. Ferraro has been hammering this point home for months.

"I've got one in my district that just recently opened up on Nose Creek and New Berlin Road and I have a church within a tennis ball's throw of this," Ferraro said. "They are opening their doors on Sunday mornings with people with needles in their arms laying out in the parking lots. There's people getting beat up. This is an ongoing problem."

Shortly after the city council meeting, on April 22, two men and a woman robbed Pot of Gold arcade on the Westside. The robbers entered the arcade with guns and took over \$3,000 in cash from the register and

The Defendant's Statement to the Police

In a recent central Florida case, the defendant was found guilty as charged of first-degree murder, attempted sexual battery, and burglary of an occupied dwelling. The defendant was sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of parole for the murder and attempted assault of the victim.

According to the evidence, the victim, a young lady, was making an effort to return to her condo after an evening socializing and drinking with friends. The witnesses - strangers and friends alike - described her as being extremely intoxicated. She shared an Uber ride with two other young women (the good Samaritans). The good Samaritans were concerned about her well-being because she was so intoxicated. The victim was unsuccessful in gaining entrance to her condominium complex and before long the defendant, who was on duty as a security guard, approached the three women. He explained he couldn't let anyone into the building without identification or proof they were a resident. As they continued to talk, a young male resident of the building opened the outside door and allowed the victim in.

The good Samaritans eventually left and went

across the street to their own building. The defendant said that he then went looking for the victim. Video surveillance footage showed the victim wondering around inside of the building, going from one floor to another, as she tried to find her own apartment. The video also showed the defendant following the victim on various floors and in various locations. The defendant later told the police that the victim had tried to enter her apartment by using a digital lock on her door, but she was not able to recall the code. He further advised police that she told him that her key fob was in her car, so he started to go with her to the building's garage. However, the defendant told the police that the victim suddenly said she recalled the code and headed back towards her apartment. The defendant said he left her alone at that point.

The victim's friends became concerned when they were unable to contact her that afternoon and evening. They called the police, who eventually agreed to do a well-being check and met them outside her condominium complex. The defendant approached the police and the victim's friends. The police gained access to her apartment and they alone entered. Inside the apartment they discovered the victim, deceased, in her bed, wrapped in a comforter. There were signs that someone had applied bleach in the area consistent with some-

safe. They forced customers to lie down as they robbed them at gunpoint. That incident is not an outlier. Teal listed 16 other instances of criminal activity in Jacksonville and nearby cities since May 2017. Every instance involved an armed robbery or violent crime at an internet café.

94 of these establishments have received permits to operate, even though an earlier law limited that number to 25. Police in Jacksonville have not had the support or resources to enforce that law. It is guessed that there are even more cafes operating without permits.

In response, Ferraro introduced legislation that put a six-month moratorium on issuing certificates of use (COUs) for people trying to open these establishments. He acknowledged that they might not be able to shut them down, but that they might be able to stem the growth of new ones until they have a plan in place to properly enforce the rules.

One solution suggested by Teal is to amend zon-

ing codes. “The purpose of zoning is to keep incompatible uses from being next to each other,” he said. If new zoning requirements can be established, these arcades may be banned from being too close to churches or schools and the number of establishments in a certain area can be limited.

Even if a solution isn’t immediately clear, the community should be aware of the violence they attract. “We have all heard several times how this is attracting crime in our communities and our neighborhoods,” said Ferarro. “We’re looking at what we can do to stop these crimes in our communities and neighborhoods. As a district council member, it is just as important for me to make sure that somebody is safe in in District 8, 9, 10, or 1, or it doesn’t matter which one.”

The crime surrounding these businesses is too jarring for nothing to be done. If safety is Jacksonville’s top priority, then internet cafes warrant a closer look.

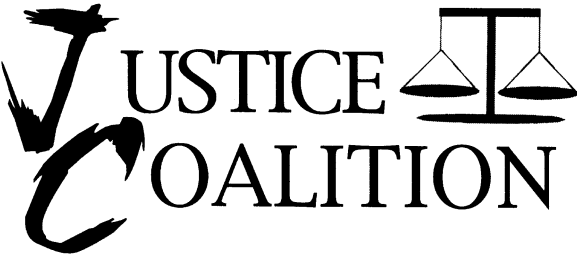

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

body attempting to clean up to remove physical evidence.

The medical examiner testified that the cause of death was asphyxiation due to manual strangulation and the death was ruled a homicide. After being advised of his Miranda rights, the defendant gave several statements to the police in which he steadfastly maintained that he had never, ever, been in the victim's apartment. However, investigators found a print from his right thumb in her bathroom and a print from his left thumb on the nightstand. Furthermore, his DNA was found on the victim.

The defendant filed a motion to suppress the statements he gave to the police, arguing that he had a subjective fear that he would be fired from his security job if he did not cooperate with the police. Previous court decisions had rendered the opinion that statements obtained under coercion, namely the threat of loss of employment, prohibited the use of those statements in evidence. The defendant admitted that neither his supervisor nor the police explicitly or implicitly told him or suggested that he would be fired from his job unless he cooperated and gave a recorded statement to the police. The defendant relied on a Florida statute requiring security guards to cooperate with the police.

The appellate court ruled that the Statute in question only required security guards to cooperate with investigations

conducted by the state department that licenses security guards. Given the absence of any evidence of explicit, implicit, or legal threats that the defendant would lose his job if

he did not provide recorded statements to the police, the court agreed with the trial judge that the statements should not be suppressed. The defendant's convictions and

sentence were affirmed by the appellate court. The case is *Duxbury v. State*, and was decided on February 22, 2019 by the Fifth District Court of Appeal.

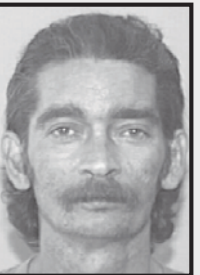

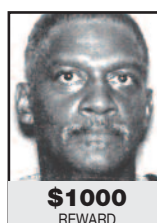
