Toughening DUI Laws for Repeat Offenders

Advocates Pledge to Make a Difference

Losing a loved one in a drunk-driving accident is tough enough in itself, but that pain is compounded by the fact that their death was senseless and likely preventable. Driving while under the influence is a serious offense and for good reason. Drunk driving crashes claim more than 10,000 lives per year.

It's reasonable to assume that DUI laws are not strong enough. There are countless cases across the country where repeat offenders continue driving with multiple DUI arrest on their record. It's often asked how a repeat DUI offender can still be allowed to drive? The answer is that each state does in fact have a limit on the number of DUIs you can have. In Florida after a fourth DUI conviction your driver's license is revoked permanently.

The problem is that a high percentage of offenders ignore these laws or find ways around them. Many choose to drive without a license or drive a car without an interlocking device. In some cases, even jail time is reduced through plea deals.

Justice Coalition Executive Director Jo-Lee Manning knows all too well how the decision to drive



drunk can end tragically. Her life changed permanently in 2013 when her daughter Haley Smith was killed by a hit-and-run driver in St. Augustine. On Kenton Morrison Road a pick-up truck clipped Haley as she walked home with a friend and her friend's father.

Finally in 2017, several tips led investigators to a suspect. Tiffany Higginbotham was charged and sentenced to 17 years in prison. Un-

Attorney General Moody Sole State AG to Serve on National Law Enforcement Commission

During a ceremony last month in Washington, D.C., Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody was appointed by U.S. Attorney General William P. Barr to the Presidential Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice. On Oct. 28, 2019, President Donald J. Trump signed Executive Order No. 13896, authorizing and designating the U.S. Attorney General to create such a Commission that would explore modern issues affecting law enforcement that most impact the ability of American policing to reduce crime. The launch of the Commission was announced at today's ceremony as well. Attorney General Moody is the only state attorney general appointed to the Commission.

Attorney General Ashley Moody said, "I am honored to serve on President Trump's Commission on Law Enforcement and the Administration of Justice to enhance the safety of all Americans. President Trump's support of our brave law enforcement officers and his commit-



ment to protecting law-abiding Americans is inspiring, and through my service on his Commission, I will work every day to further this worthy mission.

"As a former prosecutor, judge and now as Florida's Attorney General, I understand uniquely the toll crime

takes on families, communities and the taxpayers. As the wife of a law enforcement officer, I know the sacrifices involved when a loved one risks their personal safety to ensure the safety of others. I look forward to working with Attorney General Barr and my fellow Commissioners to identify strategies and innovative solutions to help reduce crime, support our law enforcement officers and protect the American people."

The Commission is instructed, through President Trump's Executive Order, to conduct its study by focusing on the law enforcement officers who are tasked with reducing crime on a daily basis. It also directs the Commission to research "important current issues facing law enforcement and the criminal justice system," and recommends a variety of subjects for study, such as, but not limited to:

- The challenges to law enforcement associated with mental illness, homelessness, substance abuse, and other social factors that influence crime and strain criminal justice resources;
- The recruitment, hiring, training, and retention of law enforcement officers, including in rural and tribal communities;
- Refusals by State and local prosecutors to enforce laws or prosecute categories of crimes;
- The need to promote public confidence and respect for the law and law enforcement officers;
- The effects of technological innovations on law enforcement and the criminal justice system, including the challenges and opportunities presented by such innovations.

The Commission will principally conduct its study through a series of hearings, panel presentations, field visits, and other public meetings. At these events, the Commission will hear from subject matter experts, public officials, private citizens, forcement and the communities they serve.

and other relevant stakeholders and institutions who can provide valuable insight into these issues.

The Commissioners, appointed by U.S. Attorney General Barr and announced today, are urban police chiefs, state prosecutors, county sheriffs, members of rural and tribal law enforcement, federal agents, U.S. Attorneys, and Attorney General Moody—the only state attorney general appointed to the Commission. In addition to their diverse experiences and backgrounds, each member brings to the Commission an expertise in formulating and shaping law enforcement policy and leading police departments and law enforcement organizations.

The Commission will meet monthly for the next year and then report its findings to the U.S. Attorney General, who will submit a final report to the President.

Supporting law enforcement, addressing mental health challenges facing the criminal justice system and combating the opioid crisis are top priorities of Attorney General Moody's administration. Since taking office in 2019, Attorney General Moody has: Conducted a statewide series of round table events focused on mental health and Florida's criminal justice system; Launched a new comprehensive resource to educate Floridians about the dangers of misusing prescription painkillers and other opioids, such as heroin and fentanyl; Chaired multiple meetings of the new Statewide Task Force on Opioid Abuse in an effort to develop a statewide strategy to identify best practices to combat the opioid epidemic through education, law enforcement efforts, treatment, prevention and recovery; and Created a Back the Blue award to highlight law enforcement officers, citizens and organizations taking extraordinary steps to forge positive relationships between law en-



A father walks into the market followed by his ten-yearold son. The kid is spinning a 25-cent piece in the air and catching it between his teeth. As they walk through the market someone bumps into the boy at just the wrong moment and the coin goes straight into his mouth and lodges

gets up from his seat and makes his unhurried way across the market. Reaching the boy (who is still standing, but only just) the man takes hold of the kid and squeezes gently but firmly. After a few seconds the boy coughs up the quarter, which the man catches in his free hand.

The man then walks back to his seat in the coffee bar without saying a word. As soon as he is sure that his son was fine, the father rushes over to the man and starts effusively thanking him. The man looks embarrassed and brushes off the thanks.

As he's about to leave, the father asks one last question. "I've never seen anybody do anything like that before - it was fantastic - what are you, a surgeon or something like

"No" the man replies, "I work for the IRS, getting people to cough it up is my business."

believably, Higginbotham was serving a sentence for another hit-and-run at the time of her arrest. Manning says that Higginbotham had admitted to taking drugs.

Unfortunately, this isn't all that uncommon. Florida has a reputation as one of the lowest rated drunk driving law states. Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) gives Florida a 2.5 out 5 rating for their drunk driving laws. (Only 10 states are rated lower). The good news is progress is slowly being made towards making the roadways safer, particularly in the way of new legislature.

Last year Senator Rick Scott introduced the Reduce Impaired Driving for Everyone Act (RIDE Act). If passed the legislation would require that all new vehicles would require alcohol detection devices beginning in 2024. In short, these devices will not allow the engine to start if a person's blood alcohol level is above a certain limit.

Also, in January Florida State Senator David Simmons filed a bill to create a type of diversion program for people who have been caught driving drunk. Simmons calls the bill a melding of "accountability and compassion."

Locally, the Justice Coalition is fighting hard for all victims of hit-and-run and DUI-related incidents. In January Manning joined with the North Florida Bicycle Club to attend a pre-trial appearance of Henry Haigler. Susanne Landino and Bonnnie Parry were killed when Haigler's car slammed into them as they rode their bicycles on June 15, 2019. Haigler plead guilty to leaving the scene of the crash. Afterwards, Manning was in the courthouse hallwa offering hugs and kind words to anyone that needed them.

Manning is also planning a trip to Tallahassee later this month to get the attention of lawmakers. "We have to change the way judges, the politicians, the lawmakers, and the public think about DUI," Manning

For a DUI victim's family, it's hard to cope with the added anguish that their death was probably preventable. One person made a terrible decision that will affect countless people. The best we can hope for is that through victim stories like Manning, Landino, and Parry that someone will be encouraged to do the right thing. Call an Uber.

Call a cab. Walk home. Don't get behind the wheel.

Drinking and Driving

If you drink alcohol, even a little, your chances of being in an accident are much greater than if you did not drink any alcohol.

No one can drink alcohol and drive safely, even if you have been driving for many years. Young drivers are more affected by alcohol because their bodies are still in the growth process, and their livers have not developed to the extent that they can efficiently process the alcohol in their blood stream.

Because drinking alcohol and then driving is so dangerous, the penalties are very tough. People who drive after drinking risk heavy fines, higher insurance rates, loss of license and even jail sentences.

The Dangers of Drinking and Driving

Alcohol reduces all of the

important skills necessary to drive safely, such as judgment, reaction, vision and concentration. Alcohol is absorbed into the lining of the stomach and then passes directly into the bloodstream. It reaches your brain in 20 to 40 minutes. Alcohol affects those areas of your brain that control judgment and skill. This is one reason why drinking alcohol is so dangerous; it affects your judgment. Good judgment is important to driving but in this case, judgment helps you to know when to stop drinking. In a way, it's like alcohol puts good judgment on hold. You do not know when you have had too much to drink until it is too late. It is a little like sunburn, by the time you feel it, it is already too late.

Alcohol slows your reflexes and reaction time, reduces your ability to see clearly and makes you less alert. As the amount of alcohol in your body increases, your judgment worsens and your skills decrease. You will have trouble judging distances, speeds and the movement of other vehicles. You will also have trouble controlling your vehicle.

If You Drink, When Can You Drive?

The best advice is if you drink alcohol, do not drive. Even one drink of alcohol can affect your driving. With two or more drinks in your bloodstream you are impaired and could be arrested.

It takes about an hour for your body to get rid of each drink. Time is the only thing that will sober you up.

There are ways of dealing with social situations. Arrange to go with two or more persons and agree which one of you will not drink alcohol. You can rotate among the group being a "designated driver". You can use public transportation or use a cab, if available.
